The first mortgage holders of the N. J. Midland Ry. met in New York Thursday to consider plans for the reorganization of the road. After the reading of a financial report by the receiver, which showed that the earnings of the road barely paid its running expenses, a committee submitted a plan for the speedy foreclosure of the first mortgage; for the protection of the three years; limiting the capital stock to Stroudsburg, Oct. 21-4t.] \$4,000,000, of which \$1,200,000 is to be paid to the first mortgage bondholders, at the rate of \$400 of stock for each \$1,000 of bonds; for issuing \$1,500,000 of second preferred stock to second mortgree bond holders, and \$600,000 common stock to ereditors of the old company, including third mortgage bondholders; and finally for the management of the read by fifteen

Ex-Gov. Peice of New Jersey said the Midland bonds were worthless, and that the only way to resuscitate the road was to give it a connection with the Pennsylvania coal mines. The business awaited the road; all that was necessary was to make the connection.
