A big Newfoundland dog belonging to Michael J. McFadden and Barnes had had a dispute in the presence of the dog, and it is thought that he understood how matters stood between them, and wanted to avenge his master.

The wolves of Wisconsin are unusually bold this season. They even come into the villages and attack men. On a late evening a pack of the beasts attacked a citizen at Parkers, Clark county, on the road half a mile from town, and manifested a most determined disposition to make a meal of him. He succeeded in fighting them off, and reached home a much frightened man. Children are carefully housed after night in towns and country. The vicious brutes often invade villages and serenade the inhabitants with the music of their howls.

The essence of justice is mercy. Making a child suffer for wrong-doing is merciful to the child. There is no mercy in letting the child have its own will, plunging headlong to destruction with the bits in its mouth. We may deliver his body from prison, but not at the expense of justice, nor to his own injury.—Chapin.

The Chicago Times publishes this, but the public will do as they please about accepting it as gospel truth: A negro known as "Uncle Ben," has been found on the Filson plantation, eight miles from Chappell hill, in Washington county, Texas, who says he was a good-sized boy, blowing the bellows in a blacksmith shop in Virginia, at the time of Braddock's defeat in 1754. He lost his eyesight at about 60 years of age, but in the course of 20 years it returned to him, and he sees as well as anybody now. His hair turned white with age, turned black again, and is now white the second time. He now masticates with his third set of teeth. He has had 14 wives, is the father of 85 children, and is hale, hearty and active. From his statements he must be 140 or 155 years old. The Centennial can have him if they want him.

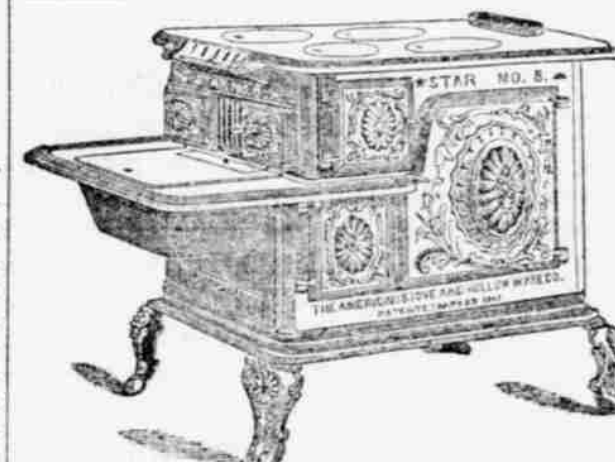

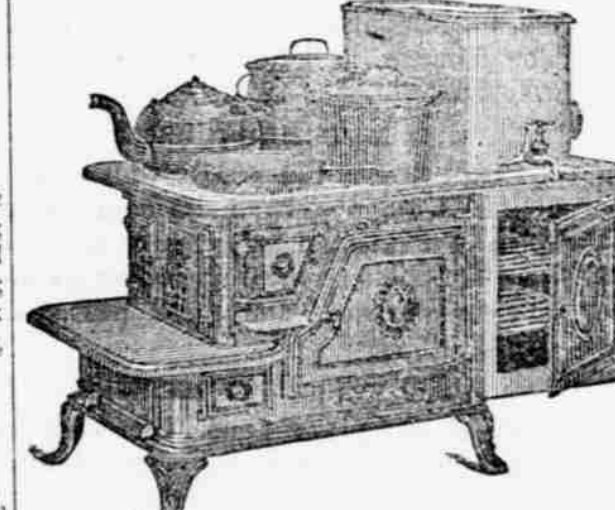

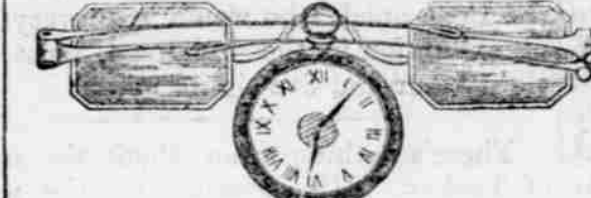
