A MATTER OF POPULAR INTEREST.

We condense from the Lehigh Register the substance of a onversation about Oak Hall, in Philadechia Wanamaker & Brown's "Largest Clothing Jase in America." A visitor and attendant he the speakers:

Visitor. "What corner is the Building on?"

Attendant. "South-East corner of Sixth and Market. Please note the SIXTH, for some strangers seeking Oak Hall, have been misled by designing persons."

V. "It is perfectly colossal! Do you know A. "12,000 square feet—66 on Market, and 180 odd on Sixth, six stories high, has over three acres of flooring, and covers space once occupied by core man twenty different busi-ness places." ness places."
V. "Do you use steam-power?"

A. "A giant young engine furnishes power for the freight and passenger elevators, and the boilers steam for heating, and the other operations of the house."

V. "What order do you take with goods?"
