

THE MAINE ELECTION.

A CLEAN REPUBLICAN SWEEP.

A Boston Advertiser dispatch says: "The Republicans have swept every congressional district. Thomas B. Reed is elected in the First district by about 1,000 majority; William P. Frye, in the Second district by about 2,000; Stephen D. Lindsay, in the Third district by about 3,500 majority; Lowell Paine, in the Fourth district by about 2,000, and Eugene Hall, in the Fifth district by about 2,500."

PORTLAND, Sept. 12.—Returns up to this afternoon give the Republicans twenty-nine senators and the Democrats two. Thus far sixty-seven Republican representatives have been reported elected against seven for the Democrats.

AUGUST, Sept. 12.—The Kennebec Journal has returns from two hundred and eighty-seven towns and plantations, giving a total vote of 113,039; Connor, 63,743; Talbot, 49,296; Connor's majority 14,447. The same towns last year gave a total of 92,607; Connor, 48,435; Roberts, 44,173; Connor's majority 4,273—Republican net gain 10,184.

VERMONT.

COMPLETE RETURNS. BOSTON, Sept. 8.—Complete returns of the Vermont gubernatorial vote give Fairbanks 44,585; Bingham, 21,035, and scattering 23; Fairbanks' majority, 23,550. In 1874 the vote stood; Peck, 33,572; Bingham, 13,250, and scattering 21. Full returns of the lower house give the Republicans 205, Democrats 31, no choice 5—a Democratic loss of 28.

RAILROAD INDENTURESS.—The Reading road has an indebtedness of \$60,854 per mile; the L. V. road, \$79,517; the Lackawanna, \$104,000; the Central of New Jersey, \$547,748 per mile! The dividends of the Central New Jersey were 8 per cent in 1873; 10 per cent in 1874; 10 in 1875; the Reading paid 10 in 1873; 12 1/2 in 1874; and 10 in 1875; the Lackawanna, 10 in 1873; and 10 in 1874; the Lehigh, 10 in each of the 3 years.
