THERE is an old saying that "straws show which way the wind is blowing," and this "straw" shows which way the wind will blow in November:—A vote was taken among the visitors to the Senate Chamber and House of Representatives, Washington, Wednesday last, resulting—Hayes, 610; Tilton, 325. Thirty-six States were represented, the leading ones indicating as follows:—Indiana, 41 to 31; Ohio, 151 to 53; New York, 67 to 29; Illinois, 97 to 17; Pennsylvania, 77 to 37; Kentucky, 9 to 25; Virginia, 19 to 22; Tennessee, 2 to 8; Colorado and New Jersey, 2 to 0; Wisconsin, 29 to 10; West Virginia, 13 to 8; Michigan, 20 to 10. The figures first given represent in each case the vote for Hayes.

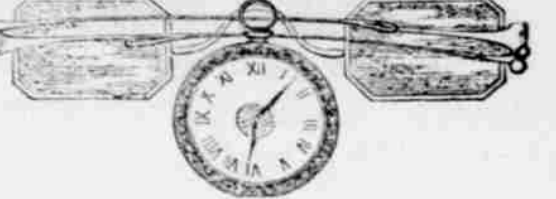

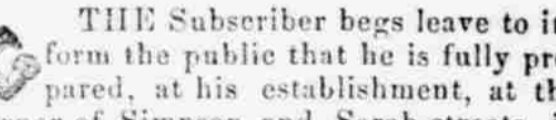
