RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—On Friday evening last, about 8 o'clock, Mr. Peter Macord, an engineer on the D. L. & W. coal train, met with a fatal accident this side of Oakland Station, on the southern division. He was standing on the foot-board to the side of the engine, oiling up, while the train was running at the rate of fourteen miles an hour and was hurled with fearful force across one of the rails of the northern bound track. He was picked up in an insensible condition and brought to East Stroudsburg where he lingered until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, when death relieved him of his sufferings. His remains were sent to Hyde Park, on the night-train, accompanied by an escort of six engineers of the brotherhood and some friends. He was 41 years of age, and leaves a wife and three children to mourn his untimely end. Mr. M. has been employed on different railroads, in New York State and Pennsylvania for 25 years, and during all that time never received a wound or scratch. He was an industrious and sober man, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. Dr. Bush was called and attended to the wants of the sufferer.
