The Cholera at Hamburg was on the decline. Paris, though tranquil, is in an inflammable state since the June insurrection.

The news of a further armistice between King Charles Albert and the Emperor of Austria, for a period of three weeks, is confirmed; and further, that three governments of England, France, and Austria, have agreed that the city of Venice shall remain free and unoccupied during the term of an armistice.

The Thames now emits such an effluvia that the atmosphere of the streets adjacent is said to have become poisoned.

Richard Wotten, the Oxford Banker, has died, leaving a fortune of two and a half millions of dollars.

It is said that the British line of steamers for this country, is shortly to have its station changed from Liverpool to Holyhead.

THE REBELLION IN RUSSIA—THE CHARACTER OF THE EMPEROR. St. Petersburg, Sept. 10, 1848.

We have just had a little insurrection, and even barricades. The following are the details:—The cholera had diminished in intensity, but at the commencement of last week it suddenly broke out anew, and the number of new cases and deaths increased daily in an alarming manner.

Two of the insurgents commenced a reply the Emperor, but his Majesty interrupted them, and told the other insurgents to retreat them. The Emperor then ordered the troops to withdraw from their barracks, and he withdrew.

THE POSTMASTER GENERAL ON SUNDAY. In reply to a letter from Rev. Mr. Lloyd, of Phelps, N. Y., the Hon. Cave Johnson, Postmaster General, returned the following answer, which we copy from the N. Y. Observer:—

I should be gratified to see the transportation of the mails, as well as every species of labor rest on the Sabbath. But the Postmaster General is the agent of the public. It is his duty to make and carry out, as far as is his power, such mail arrangements as the wishes and interests of the public require.

Where the stated means of conveyance on mail routes are kept in operation upon the Sabbath, whether the mails be sent or not, no inconvenience, and much individual loss and injury would inevitably result unless the mails be despatched by them.

When the proprietors are disposed to withdraw these means of conveyance on that day, and there is no likelihood of others being substituted, so as to give facilities to a few to the disadvantage and injury of the many, it is a pleasure in according to the arrangement so far as the mails are concerned, as has lately been done upon the line of railroad between Albany and Buffalo, following the example set by the New York and Boston and Boston and Albany lines.

The means communication are never withdrawn by the proprietors, but upon the best evidence that the public, or a large majority of it, are willing to dispense with them. And although my own feelings, under the influence of the considerations alluded to in your letter, are gratified by the suppression of the Sabbath mails, my official action in sanctioning it is founded solely upon the conviction that their withdrawal is in such cases warranted by the general consent of the public.
