WHOLESALE REMOVAL OF THE DE-

Astounding Disclosures-\$127,000 in Specie Abstracted from the Missouri Bank. Sr. Louis, August 13.

A deficit of \$127,000 was discovered in the Bank of Missouri, on Saturday last. The disclosure has caused much excite-

ment in our community, though no fears need be entertained as to the solveney of the bank. It appears that on Friday afternoon a heavy draft was presented by Page & Bacon. in paying which the paying teller had occasion to resort to some boxes containing foreign coin. These boxes, together with a number of others, had been laid aside to await an opportunity to be sent to the mint for recoining their contents; and, as the key of the vault containing the American gold had been temporarily displaced, these were resorted to. On opening the first box, the teller was astonished to find that'a bag of ten thaler pieces had been abstracted-he immediately opened another box, when, lo! a bag of sovereigns was gone-and so on through the remainder of the boxes.

The Teller immediately made the President of the Bank acquainted with the deficit, and a meeting of the directors was held on Saturday morning for the purpose of investigating the matter. It was soon made apparent that some thirty-three boxes of foreign coin-one hundred and twenty-seven thousand dollars-han been abstracted!

The coin was all counted and sealed up last March. So far, only the foreign gold has been counted, but a thorough examination will be had to-day.

It is thought the defalcation will not be found materially greater.

Suspicion having rested on the late Paying Teller, Nathaniel Childs, he was arrested and held to bail in the sum of \$30,000, until Wednesday, when further investigations will be made.

RELATIVE TO AM AMENDMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION.

RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSTLVANIA IN GRECHEAL ASSEMBLY MEET, That the Constitution of this Commonwealth be smended in the second section of the fifth article, so that it shall read as follows: The Judges of the Supreme Court, of the several Courts of Common Pleas, and of such other Courts of Record as are or shall be established by law, shall be elected by the qualified electors of the Commonwealth in the manner following, to wit: The Judges of the Supreme Court, by the qualified electors of the Commonwealth in large. The President Judges of the several Courts of Common Pleas and of such other Courts of Record as are or shall be established by law, and all other Judges required to be learned in the law, by the qualified electors of the counter respectively. 

IMPORTANT FROM CHIHUAHUA. Depredations of the Indians-Sonora and El Paso laid Waste-Cholera among United States Troops and the Camanches.

Sr. Louis, August 13. By an arrival here from Chihuahua, we learn that the Indians were very hostile in that region. They were murdering Americans and Mexicans in cold blood, wherever

an opportunity offered.

The Governor had raised and sent out a party of men to meet the enemy, offering \$50 for every scalp taken.

The Indians had entirely laid waste the State of Sonora, but the government is doing nothing to check them.

They have also entirely desolated the re-

gion around El Paso, driving off the stock and killing the inhabitants. This arrival came by way of Santa Fe, but brings nothing later from that blace. Some U. S. troops were met on the Cimaroon river, among whom there had been sev-

erni cases of cholera. The cholera had severely scourged the Indians of the Arkansas, and many hundreds

had died. Mr. Angus Boggs, at Independence, from Santa Fe, writes that three hundred Indians, principally Camanches, had died on the Arkansas river. The rest of the tribes had dispersed and gone South. These are the Indians from whom trouble was feared by the

The St. Joseph's Gazette publishes a letter rom Dr. Edgar, of the army, written at Fort Laramie, stating that there had been 45 cases

of cholera and 7 deaths among the soldiers. The health of the emigrants along the Plains was rapidly improving. They had thrown away much property in order to facilitate their march. Wagons which cost \$135, were sold for \$5.

Mr. Roe, an emigrant from Wisconsin was murdered by the Sioux Indians, while hunting on the Platte river.
