ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMSHIP HIBERNIA.

SEVEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. TELEGRAPH OFFICE, SACKVILLE, N. B. Saturday Afternoon, Nov. 2. The Hibernia, Captain Blunt, after a very rough passage across the Atlantic, dropped her anchor in the harbor of Halifax at about 7 o'clock last evening.

TURKEY AND RUSSIA.

There is no later news, in the European Times, (the only paper that has come to hand) from Constantinople or St. Petersburg, and of course, we have got no solution of the difficulty between the Porte and the Autocrat.

A letter from Vienna says the necessities of the State require that new taxes should be levied, and those already existing increased. Thus the impost on the soil, buildings, trades and professions, will be considerably augmented, and an income tax introduced.

There is a rumor from, in consequence of the relation in which Louis Napoleon stands with the Czar, he would gladly forego the support of the nation in behalf of Turkey.

FRANCE.

The deliberations of the National Assembly were almost wholly devoted, on the 12th and 13th ult., to the report of M. Thiers on the Roman question. The report is decidedly conservative, and at variance with the expressed views of the President's letter to M. Ney.

At a Ministerial Council held subsequently, it was decided that the Government would follow exclusively the policy laid down in the letter of the President on the affairs of Rome.

IRELAND.

The anti-rent conspiracy in Ireland is extending throughout all parts of that ill-fated land. The local journals are filled with accounts of the abduction of crops.

The fearful effects of the potato blight, of the fever, the cholera, and the other diseases by which Ireland has been desolated, seemed likely to be far exceeded by the calamitous results of the moral pestilence that is spreading rapidly throughout the land.

AUSTRIA AND HUNGARY.

A treaty between Austria and Prussia was signed at Vienna, Sept. 30th, and ratified by Prussia on the 10th ult., which provides that Austria and Prussia should assume the administration of the Central Power of the German Confederation, in the name of all the Governments of the Confederation, until the 1st of May, 1850, unless this power be transferred to a definitive power before that period.

General Haynau, in his administration of the military affairs of Hungary, loses no opportunity to preserve the bloody epithet that has been so universally applied to him. He has thus far succeeded in murdering, under the guise of a court martial, thirteen Hungarian generals, who delivered themselves up at the close of the war, and induced their soldiers to lay down their arms; and to make

the tragedy display a suitable denouement, Count Bathiany, the Prime Minister of Hungary, has been slain, under circumstances which forever will make the Austrian name synonymous with cruelty, treachery and dishonor.

To avoid the agony of a halter, the wife of the patriot had a dagger conveyed to him in his linen, with which to anticipate his doom. The Count did not succeed in the suicide, but his throat was so much injured by the wound he had inflicted, that he prevented his murderers from strangling him with the cord. He fell, pierced to the heart by the bullets of Austrian soldiers, his last words being "My country forever!"

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A letter from Remin, dated October 10, says that the Austrian General, Kuriab, had arrived at Widdien, from which the dates reached to the 6th inst., with a letter from General Haynau to the Pasha, by which the Hungarian refugees, from the sergeants downwards, are pardoned, in consequence of which the greater part of them returned to Hungary.

Accounts from Rome are the reverse of satisfactory. The return of the Pope is still talked about, but when it may take place is still the subject of conjecture.

A large and highly respectable meeting, presided over by the Lord Mayor, took place at the Egyptian Hall, London, on the 17th ult., relative to the proposed exhibition of industry of all nations in that city, during the ensuing year.

ENGLAND.

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The excitement growing out of the dismissal of Rod Roden from the magistracy, seems likely to lead to very serious results; Orangemen and Repealers are once more glaring at each other with the malice of fiends; the Orangemen of the North are preparing for a grand field day on the 5th of November, the anniversary of the Gunpowder plot, which, if not prevented by the strong arm of the law, can hardly fail to end in the shedding of blood.

HORRIBLE CRIME.

St. Louis, Nov. 6.—A revolting case of rape and murder took place the other day, near Palmyra. A negro belonging to Mr. Glascock committed violence on Miss Bright an interesting little girl, 14 years of age, and then murdered her. For fear of being detected the inhuman monster turned round and killed her brother, aged 11 years.

THE November term of our Court commenced its sessions on Monday. The fine weather made the attendance unusually large. The hotels were crowded to excess. The business in the Quarter Sessions was small as usual. This speaks well for the morality of our country. It is so rare an occurrence for any of our citizens to be lodged in prison that the building has become almost useless.

THE last Gazette devotes to the tariff and us, nearly a column, whose hackneyed phrase and puerile arguments bear the earmarks of its paternity. We are not disposed to controvert the opinion therein advanced, that the tariff of '46 caused the famine in Ireland, nor can we deny that the immense exportation of breadstuffs was owing chiefly to that famine.

THE Whig ticket is probably elected by 2000 majority. The Clerk is rather doubtful, and claimed by both parties. The Whigs have certainly elected ten Aldermen out of eighteen. The Whigs have also, according to the returns, a majority in the Board of Assistants.
