WASHINATON, Jan. 23. House.-Committees were called on for reports, and the House passed a bill to enable an old Revolutionary soldier to locate two pieces of land script.

Mr. Johnson, of Tenn., from the Committee on Agriculture, reported a bill to encourage agriculture commerce and manufactures, by giving to every head of a family one hundred and sixty acres of land, provided they coltivate the same for a certain period.

Mr. Johnson moved the bill be refered to the Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union, and said this bill ought to have passed instead of the Bounty Land Bill of last session, which gave forty-eight millions to soldiers not previously provided for. His scheme would have kept out of the hands of Shylocks a large number of warrants, and been of more benefit to those who are bodily able to cultivate the soil.
