NEW YORK, Oct. 4. The steamship Prometheus, Capt. Churchill, arrived here this evening, from San Juan with news from California to the 6th ult., the passage having been made in the unparalleled short 'time of 25 days.

With regard to the election of Governor the California Courier, (Whig) of 6th September sava:

The returns thus far, though in the main imperfect, from the counties of San Francisto, Sacramento, Yolo, Nevada, El Dorado, Solano, Marin, Tuolumne, San Joaquin, Calaveras, and Santa Clara, give Reading a majority over Bigler of about 1000, and the balance of the State ticket from 600 to 800 .-The counties of Mendocino, Napa, Klamath, Trinity, Shasta, Los Angelos, San Lois Opispo, Santa Barbara, and Santa Cruz, will give Reading at least 5,000 majority. This puts his election beyond the possibility of a doubt, and the same vote will elect the most of our State ticket.

ARRIVAL OF THE 0H10-\$2,000,000 IN
