Alexander Jordan, Esq., was called to preside, and Wm. L. Greenough, acted as Secretary.

The motion of J. R. Priestley, Esq., it was resolved that the Agricultural Fair or Exhibition, be held at Sunbury, on FRIDAY, the 17th day of October, to be opened at 10 o'clock, A. M.—on such grounds as a Committee appointed for the purpose shall procure.

Resolved., That Samuel Hunter, Alexander Jordan, Geo. C. Welker, Jacob Seeholz, Wm. L. Greenough, Peter Oberdorf, and Wm. L. Dewart, compose that Committee.
