New York, June 13. The steamship Baltic, with four days later Intelligence from Europe arrived at an early hour this morning.

ENGLAND. The floor of the Corn Exchange in Brunswick street, Liverpool, gave way, at noons on the 1st instant, precipitating upwards of 100 merchants to the vaults beneath .-None, however, were killed, although a number were more or less injured. Some repairs were being made at the time, and the workingmen had incautiously removed a portion of the supports, which caused the floor to give way. Two of the workmen were killed.

The steamship Sarah Sands, put into Falmouth, May 31st, short of coals.

Nothing done in Parliament. The particulars of the capture of Rangom by British troops had been received.

The loss in the engagement was small .-The cholera had broken out among the troops, and the soldiers of the different regiments were dying in numbers. Several officers had also fallen victims. FRANCE

The Moniteur declares that the warlike rumors are unfounded, and that the right of the French nation to fix its own form of government has never been menaced or contested by other powers.

More refusals to take the oath of allegiance are announced. The refusals come principally from members of the General Council, no fewer than twenty-two or more of whom have resigned their offices rather than swear allegiance to Louis Napoleon.

The Committee of the Budget have adopted an amendment to the effect that no credit should be allowed for the sale of the Orleans estates.

The marriage of M. de Persigny with Mdlle De La Moskowa took place on Friday night, at the Chapel of the Elysee.

The advocate of the Council of State charged to defend the appeal of the Orleans family against the decrees relative to their property, have published a memoir, from which it appears that they intend to rely upon four points of law, and also that the ordinary judicial tribunals have jurisdiction in the case.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.

Advices from the Cape to the 18th of April had been received. The war it was generally thought, was being brought to a close. Hostilities were suspended, and treaties were being entered into. Sir Harry Smith and lady came home on the steamer Gladiator. SWITZERLAND.

Accounts from Friburg state that a meeting of the partizans of the Government had been convoked. New arrests had taken place. The Patriotic Society, to the number of 800, had held a meeting and passed a resolution calling on the Government to defend with the utmost energy, the conquest of 1847.

RUSSIA. Cronstadt letters of the 21st ult., report a considerable change in the state of the ice, and that it would soon disappear. At St. Petersburg, on the 22d ult., the river was full of ice.

Letters from Andona of the 16th ult., state that the British Consul was refused permission to see Edward Murray, the English State prisoner, confined in that city. On the eve of the Ascension after Vespers, the Pope was carried in great pomp to the balcony of the Vatiean, whence amidst the roaring of Artillery, he gave his Benediction to the people, surrounded by the French and Roman troops. AUSTRIA.

Accounts from Vienna to May 26th, state that every possible means has been taken to conceal the real state of political feeling in the different provinces, from the knowledge of the inhabitants of the Capital. The state of the finances is very discour-

aging, and the first cannon fired, as a signal of war, in Europe, cannot fail to plunge everything into irretrievable disorder and

RAILWAY ACCIDENTS IN ENGLAND .- The returns relating to railway accidents in Great Britain, for the half year ending December 31, 1851, has just been published. The number of passengers carried was 47,509,392; the number killed was 113; injured, 264. Eight passengers were killed and 213 injured from causes beyond their control; 9 passengers were killed and 14 injured owing to their own misconduct or want of caution; 32 servants of the companies or contractors were killed and 11 injured, owing to their own want of caution; 33 trespassers and other persons, neither passengers nor servants of the company, were killed, and 9 injured, by crossing or walking on railways. The length of railways in operation was 6,890 miles.

AMERICAN AND BRITISH SHIPS-A CHAL-LENGE-The Boston Atlas states that two or three Boston ship-owners have sent a challenge to the ship-owners of Great Britain, somewhat to the following effect: The Boston parties will produce a ship, not less than 800, nor over 1200 tons register, capable of stowing 50 per cent, over her register, to compete in speed with any vessel of the same capacity, now built, or which may hereafter be built in Great Britain; the winning party to receive £10,000, and the race to be a voyage to China. This will put the British shipwrights to their metal.
