It appeared that the women drove to Gorham, 15 miles, where they took the cars to Portland. At Portland they took the steam- York, Easten and Bullingers. boat to Lawrence, and arrived in Boston on Saturday moning, and took the afternoon train for Springfield. From thence they proceeded to Delton, in Berkshire Co. From this they traveled six miles on foot, and in the night, the boy in the mean time suffering extreme physical agony. Dr. Weeks traced them in company with an officer, and found the kidnappers with the kidnapped box, in a house two miles from any neighbors, in a wild and mountainous region, over the New York line.

The women refused to surrender the boy, and resisted the officer most pertinacionsly. In fact they fought like desperadoes, and in the encounter the officer was much injured. and the clothes of the women were nearly torn from their bodies in the melce. They were finally taken into custody, and conveyed to the county jail, where they will remain till a requisition is forwarded from the Governor of Maine to the Governor of New York. The kidnappers carried their charge over six hundred miles. One of the women is about 50 years old, and the other about 25. The six miles they travelled on foot was over a range of the Green Monntains. Then names are suppressed at the request of Dr. Weeks.
