ARRIVAL OF THE PACIFIC. LATER FROM EUROPE.

Write movements—Impending rupture between Russia and Turkey—Russian Army on the frontier—Nankin taken by the Rebels—Commodore Perry at Hong Kong—British Army in Bunkah Repulsed.

RUSSIA AND TURKEY.

Menshikoff, the Austrian Ambassador, left Constantinople on the 22d, and arrived at Odessa the next day.

The Russian army, 100,000 strong is concentrating on the Turkish frontier.

The Ministers of France, England, Prussia and Austria had made a joint attempt to reconcile the parties, but Menshikoff and the Divan appeared to be equally inflexible.

So the former left Constantinople and the Ottoman fleet was sent for to prepare for emergencies. Part of the fleet has been sent to Egypt for the troops that the Abbas Pasha has already mustered.

The Minister of War also despatched couriers to every Ottoman province to call out the whole warlike resources of the empire.

The whereabouts of the French fleet is not ascertained, and orders of the British fleet are kept with the most profound secrecy.

Affairs now appear to be critical, but may still all be quietly settled.

CHINA.

The latest reliable intelligence from Shanghai is to the 28th of April. The city of Nankin was invested by the rebels on the 16th of April.

The Imperial Commissioner, for the purpose of relieving the city by water, hired a fleet of boats from the Portuguese.

Before they could reach the city, the rebels captured them.

In this strait the Commissioner besought aid from the foreign Consuls and the French, English and Americans agreed to assist the Imperial Government.

The British Consul sent the Salamander, Lily, the Hermès steamer; the French consular sent the steam frigate Cassini, and the American Commissioner, Mr. Marshall, undertook to place the Susquehanna frigate before Nankin.

No accounts had been received of the result, but there were many rumors of Imperial victories in the interior, but no reliance was placed on them.

Commodore Perry, with the steam frigate Mississippi, arrived at Hong Kong on the 7th of April, and he despatched the Plymouth to Shanghai on the 9th.

STILL LATER FROM CHINA.

A private letter, received at Manchester, brings dates from Shanghai to the 29th of April, one day later than the above.

This letter states that Nankin had fallen into the hands of the rebels. The commander of the British fleet refuses to permit British merchantmen up the river with stores or ammunition for either party.

It was expected that the American commander would adopt the same course.

Vanderbilt's steam yacht, the North Star, arrived at Southampton on the 1st inst.

Among the passengers on board the Pacific are Lewis Cass, Jr., Chargé d'Affaires at Rome, and H. J. Raymond.

Of the Assistant Editors, 1 (C. A. Dana) is General and Foreign; 1 (George Ripley) Literary; 1 (Bayard Taylor), formerly of Penn'a; 1 (George M. Snow) Commercial; 3 (J. F. Cleveland, Donald C. Henderson, and Alex. W. Thayer) Domestic News; 1 (William Newman) Ship News; 1 (Franklin J. O'Rourke) City News; and 1 (Reporter), 5 are of Police; 2 of Lectures; 2 of General News; 1 of the Courts; 1 of Adversaries; 1 of Pines; 1 of Meetings; 1 of Williamsburg Items; 1 of Jersey City, and 1 of Brooklyn.

Of the Correspondents, 1 writes from London; 1 from Dublin; 1 from Liverpool; 1 from Paris; 1 from Constantinople; 1 from Philadelphia; 2 from Washington; 1 from Albany; 1 from the Plains; 1 from Mexico; 1 from Havana; 1 from California; 1 from Toronto; 10 Irregular; and 2 Telegraphic Reporters. Thomas McClath, Esq., recently of Lancaster county, and a native of Pennsylvania, is the publisher.

Looker, Foreman of the Composing Room; George Hall, Foreman of the Press Room; and Patrick Rogan, one of the Engineers in the Press Room.
