We have received, says the New York Herald, the official record of the operations of Col. Walker's party, the details of the battle of La Paz, and the choice of a President of the new republic.

Head Quarters of the Republic of Lower California, Nov. 7, 1853. On the morning of the 17th of October, we sailed with the first independent battalion for Lower California. The command consisted of forty-five men. Our voyage was a prosperous one to Cape St. Lucas; we landed on the 28th of October; there we gained some information of importance; and preseeded on our way to La Paz. On the third day of Nevember our vessel cast anchor opposite the town. A party was ordered by Colonel Walker to land, take possession of the tewn, and secure the person of the Governor-Lieutenant Gillman commanding the

In less than thirty minutes the town was taken and the Governor secured. We hauled down the Mexican flag in front of the Governor's house, proclaimed the independence of Lower California, and our independeat flag floated triumphantly where, but a few moments before, that of Mexico had waved in supposed security. Our men, provisions, and munitions of war, were landed, the town fortified, and Col. Walker entered upon his duties as President of the Republic of Lower California-issuing such decrees as were most congenial to the citizens, as well At his Store, No. 12 South Second Street, Philaas to the security and comfort of his command. Here we remained until Sunday. November 6th, when the President determined to remove the seat of government to St. Lucas. In accordance with his determination, we embarked, taking with us ex-Gov. ernor Espinosa and the public documents .-Shortly after our embarkation a vessel came into port, having on board Col. Rebelleio, who was sent by the government of Mexico to superseed ex-Governor E-pinosa. A small detachment was despatched to bring Colonel Rebolleio on board the vessel. This order was promptly executed.

About an hour after this occurrence, a party was sent on shore to procure wood .-While in the act of returning to their boats, John Hunter they were fired upon by a large party of cit- John L Yeager izens; thus commenced the first action .- D Hoats for M Sweny vs This party consisted of but six men, who returned to the vessel under a heavy fire of musketcy, without losing a man. Meantime J & A Shissler a fire was opened upon the town with our ordinance, which was kept up until Colonel Walker landed with thirty men, when the fight became general. From the time of landing until the close of the action, (a signal defeat of the enemy,) was about one and a John S Good half hours. The enemy's loss was six or Morris L Hallowell vs James Reed Garnishee seven killed and several wounded. Our men did not so much as receive a wound: except from the Cactus, while pursuing the enemy through the chaparall in the rear of the town.
