Philadelphia Market.

April 19, 1854.

**FLOUR AND MEAL.**—The Flour market is quiet, and only about 200 barrels have been sold at \$8.50 per barrel for standard superfine. Sales of Rye Flour at \$8.50. Pennsylvania Corn Meal sold at \$3.75 per bbl. GRAIN.—Wheat is in demand at an advance. Sales of 1000 bushels of white \$2.05, d \$2 for red. Rye is scarce and very dear. Corn at 90c. Corn is held in high sales at c. for yellow, a few. Oats are scarce and demand. Sales of Southern at 48c. and meslyavin at 55c. cts. WHISKY.—Sales of hams at 26.26 cents, d bbls. at 27 cents.

## Baltimore Market.

April 18, 1854.

**FLOUR.**—The Flour market is hardly as in-to-day as Saturday, notwithstanding the advice received this morning by the Agents, which note a further advance of 6d. per cwt. on the other side. This morning on carriages there were sales of 950 bbls. wheat staves, for immediate delivery, and 20 bbls. to be delivered on the 1st and 15th May at \$8.25.

**GRAIN.**—There were sales this morning of some 200 bushels of Wheat, which the rice obtained for it, and we are consequently without a quotation. About 4500 bushels of Corn were at market. There were, however, no sales made that could be heard of, save a small lot of inferior yellow at 75 cts. buyers and sellers not being able to agree upon terms. The highest figures we heard came were 75 cts for yellow, and 75 cts. or white. There was a sale of white Corn Saturday at 77 cts. A small lot of Pennsylvanian Rye was offered at 100 cts.

**WHISKEY.**—The market is quiet, uneventful, and buyers are undetermined as to what price to pay. A few hours ago a sale of 100 cts. of whisky on carriages was made for a small quantity. No sales of hams have been made for a day or two, and we have no quotation for them.
