DOES THE MOON AFFECT VEGETATION Very many practical farmers will be prompt to answer this query in the affirmative.— PLINY says that if we would collect grain for the purpose of immediate sale, we should do so at the full of the moon; because, during he moon's increase, the grain augments re markably in magnitude; but if we wou'd collect the grain to preserve it, we should choose the new moon, or the decline of it .-This maxim may find some feeble support in the fact, that, as a general thing, more rain falls during the increase of the moon than during its decrease, which may account for the augmentation of the grain in bulk, or size of the kernel; but it assuredly requires a robust faith to suppose that the moon at the distance of 240,000 miles from the earth's surface, can have any appreciable effect upon

There is also an approximation to some-thing like an established principle observable in the practice of the Agrinomes of South America in their treatment of the two classes of plan's distinguished by the production of fruit on their roots, or on their branches, but we are unable to indicate anything of the kind in the Enropean Aphorisms. Yet it is the opinion or belief of all. European gardeners that if trees or vegetables are expected to flourish with vigor, and attain their highest degree of excellence, they must be planted grafted and pruned during the increase of the moon. But this opinion, like most others relating to supposed lunar influence, is wholly fallacious: The numerous experiments recently instituted for the purpose of demon-strating the erroneousness of this belief, have proved most irrefragably that the increase or decrease of this satellite has, and necessarily can have, no appreciable effect upon the phe nomena of vegetable life or development.-Many of the maxims relating to supposed lunar influence, are substantiated by no supporting arguments or physical reasons; they exist in the form of simple prejudices, yet are acted upon by those who indulge them, with the same unwavering faith and confidence in their verity, as though they were susceptible of the clearest and most positive proof. There is scarcely a single detail embraced in the wide routine of agricultural enterprise and effort; into which this superstitious presumpton of lunar power does not more or less extensively intertwine itself. In some respects, it is perfectly harmless; in others, its effects are more momentous, and positively detrimental to the pecuniary interests and well-being of those by whom it is indulged. ORCHARDS .- PLANTING AND MANAGING

The easiest way to manage an orchard is to have it the cultivated field-the place to raise the potatoes and corn and vines. It should be on good land, accessible from the house readily, not hilly, and so situated that it might be easily overlooked. If trees are set on good land, they will make a handsome growth without having so much good earth carted about them. An orchardnear at hand will be better protected from vagrant animals,-four-legged and two-legged. If you are to be robbed, it is desirable to see how it is done!

Every year thousands of trees are thrown away by being stuck down in grass land .-When are people all to know, that such an expenditure is the sheerest folly? Suppose the trees are dug around. Soon the grass gets up again :- it is difficult to get round to the trees, and they come to the general stand-still. But suppose they do just live, and perhaps grow an inch or two ? A tree had better be dead than drag out a sickly existence. You want new shoots of the real thrifty color to burst out with unmistakable energy.

I wish that all your readers could see my neighbor Goodman's orchard in autumn; trees all in straight, handsome rows; thrifty crops growing among them,-and a team go ing to market with the abundance which seems to have no end .- [Cor. N. E. Furmer *****

TAR, A REMEDY FOR HORSE DISTEMPER. THOMAS W. LADD, of Smithfield, Jefferson county, Ohio, writes the Ohio Farmer

that he has found a remedy and cure for "distemper" in horses. He says:
"Having three colts sick with this disease,
an experienced farmer told me to use tar, and he thought that the sick colts would soon recover, and that those who had not taken the disease would not have it at all, or but lightly. I followed his direction, to my entire satisfaction. I gave the colts morning and evening, as much as I could readily get into their mouths with a paddle. After a few ap-lications, the sick ones commenced running at the nose, their appetites returned, and in a short time they had entirely regained what they had lost from disease. The others never took it to my knowledge. Some prefer mixing fish-oil with the tar, but I used it alone, and I believe it to be entirely sufficient, if the article be good, pure tar. I would have no

STRAWBERRIES, should be thoroughly cleaned of weeds, and some short grass, clean straw, or some other material, be placed about the plants as soon as they have thrown up their flower spikes. This will help to keep a uniform moisture about the roots, and the fruit from grit and dirt and heavy rains, Except where wanted to form young plants, the runners should be kept cut off, as they weaken the energy of the plant. To secure heavy crops of strawberries, it is indespensa-bly necessary to supply them with plenty of water of liquid manure if obtainable, while

Carrages -The value of cabbage for feeding, especially dairy stock, is probably greater than is usually supposed. The field cultivation of this plant is much on the increase among the farmers of Great Britain. The amount of nutriment matter which capable of being raised from an acre of land under cabbage is, comparatively with most other crops, very large, and with an extended knowledge of this fact, the cultivation of it will be probably much extended. The land requires to be rich, deep, and somewhat moist. The rows should be at least 30 inches apart, and the plants not less than 24 or 2 inches. The two best varieties for field cultivation are the Drumhead and the York.

IMPROVED WAY OF MAKING WHEAT BREAD. -The Paris correspondent of the Commer-cial Advertiser speaks of a plan invented by a baker of that city to reduce the cost of bread. He puts in one part of rice to five of wheat flour, and the economy effected reaches the very considerable figure of one sou in the two pound loaf. The government has had the bread examined by competent persons, and has authorized the sale of it, at a less rate than fixed by the police.—The demand is such that the baker cannot supply it. Neither the nutriment nor the taste of the bread would appear to be affected by the presence of the new ingredient.
