Whereas numerous complaints are almost daily made concerning the state of the streets and alleys of the Borough, and especially Broadway, and whereas. I believe it to be the duty of those who are placed in office for the purpose of executing the laws and regulations of the corporation, to see that those laws and regulations are strictly carried out, and believing that I am responsible both by law and by oath of office for the due execution of all those duties that graculoined on the Chief all those duties that are enjoined on the Chief Burgess and efficers of the Borough, I therefore give notice to every person or persons, who have, or hereafter shall have, or permit any nuisances of any kind or nature whatever upon any of the Public Streets oralleys, that unless such nuisances are removed withthat unless such nuisances are removed within twenty days from this time, that the offender will suffer the penalties prescribed by
law. For a number of years the provisions
of many sections of the act of incorporation
have been violated with impunity, and whether it was the result of neglect on the part of
those in power or not. I am unable to say,
but control it is that the time has come when but certain it is that the time has come when necessity calls for their enforcement—and in order that no individual may be surprised for sales of Pennsylvania and Southern at 69c. want of due notice, I take this method of informing them of what laws they are called upon to obey and which I have determined

to carry out. 1st .- The 12th section of the act declare any house built upon any street or niley, a punishable as such, and the offender shal pay a penalty of 30 pounds. To avoid this result I would recommend that every person desiring to build, should apply to the Borough Regulators, whose duty it is to ascertain the

true line of the street.

The 14th section of the charter provides a penalty of five pounds against every person who lays, or causes to be laid, a foundation

without applying to the regulators.

The 33d section provides a penalty of 20 shillings for casting or laying shavings, mud, ashes, or other filth or annoyance on any pavement, street, lane or alley: the offender to be convicted before either of the Burgesses of the Borough, and the person so convicted

shall pay the cost of removing the same.

The 34th section provides a penalty against any person who shall cast or throw out of any cart, wagon or other carriage, any rub-bish, dirt, or earth, in any street, lane or alley, the offender to pay the costs of removing the same upon conviction before either

The 36th section provides againt casting or throwing carrion, &c., in any nnenclosed

The Regulators are to determine the width and heighth of pavements, and all posts are to be put in as directed by them. I have observed that a number of individuals are in the habit of digging up the sand on what is commonly called the back lane, a short dis-tance below the Graveyard, and I am informed that some individuals have presumed to sell the same at 25 cents per load; this prac-tice has been carried on to such an extent as to make it unsafe for even foot travellers to pass along said lane, in consequence of the deep excavations that have been made. For the information of those individuals I would bere state that it is just as much a nuisance to dig up the soil on a public highway thereby rendering the passage of the public danger-ons and inconvenient as it is to place obstructions on the same, and that all are criminally liable whether they actually do the act or

order it to be done.

Much iron ore and lumber is placed on the river bank, which is the cause of daily com-plaint: whilst I am in favor of permitting every citizen to carry on his lawful business in any part of our town, I cannot see the justice in allowing some to occupy those por-tions of our public grounds to which no private individual can have a right, to the exclusion of others. Nearly the whole of our merely desire to occupy it for some transitory or legitimate purpose, as for instance load ing their lumber on boats, or their iron ore on cars, but they make it a permanent board yard, or place of stacking their iron ore, limestone, &c. Broadway is a public street and must be kept open for public use. Those in-dividuals who occupy it for private purposes will do well to remember that all such ob-structions are abateable, and the individuals indictable, and that it will be done. No

previous notice to remove is required by law, It is also unlawful to permit horses or mules to run at large within the Borough and the ordinances in relation thereto will be strictly enforced, and it will be well for those persons who were proceeded against last week, to bear in mind that the Esquire has changed his mind in regard to the construction of the law, and that hereafter colts will be considered as horses within the meaning of the law, and if a persons horse breaks loose and the owner does not endeavor to take him as soon as possible, he will be liable to the penalty prescribed, and that offenders shall not again escape. It is the duty of the High Constable to take up and impound all horses or mules found running at large. It is the duty of every citizen to know the law, but as our Borough ordinances have not law, but as our Borough ordinances have not been observed for many years, I have thus seen proper to give notice of my intentions. I believe that there is no use in having laws unless they are adhered to. I do not mean to be partial or selfish, but intend to serve all alike and will do my duty without respect to friend or foe. Many of our citizens remarked on the day of the election that they would vote for me because they believed that I would attend to the duties of the office. If some of these individuals do not clear away some of those individuals do not clear away the rubbish about their premises, they will find out that they were perfect prophets.
