Near that place is the village of Fuszachon, where a hundred heads of families, all Romanists by birth, have built a Protestant sanctuary at their own expense, though the civil authority has thus far refused permission to epen it. In Belgium, Protestan-tism is making rapid progress. In Bavaria, the increase of Protestants by

conversions from Popery, has become so cons devable as to cause such un-asiness to the Government and the Romanist journals.— For some years alone, conversion of Priests and Monks to the Protestant doctrines, has been of very frequent occurrence in Hungary and Bohemia. Within a few years, more than ten thousand persons in Tuscony have of Protestantism. The signs are, that the sun of Romanism is declining in the European horizon to its final setting.

ROADS TO THE PACIFIC.

One of the great wants of the country, a well made, serviceable road to the Pacificmot a radroad, for even our great progress is not equal to the collosian task of spanning the continent with an iron track, but its mecessary antecedent, a direct and well-constructed wagou road-is likely to be soon supplied. Congress has authorised the undertaking and provided the money, and the preliminaries are already arranged for the active prosecution of the work. The expense will be borne by three different departments of the government. The Department of the Interior distances \$500,000 for the construc-tion of military reads; the War Department \$100,000 for the digging of artesian wells, through which one great terror of the overland route will be removed, and the Post of-fice Department, for the transportation of the mails over the newsroad, will give out 600,000 the enterprise will embrace not only the ac-The military forces passing this spring from the far West to the Pacific slope, will be the pioneers in opening the way to the prosecution of the road, to be followed by the more careful surveys and actual facation of the line that will be made by the civil engineers under the direction of the Interior Department Once completed, the despatch of regular mails by the route will attract over it a large mass of travel, gradually marking more dismountains of the central continent, locating along the edges a line of frontier sattlements, and preparing it by a rapid process, for the final placing of the iron rails, over which locomotives, in in less than twenty years, will pass from the eastern to the western side of the continent. The general course of the man road is that of the Memph's reus. rurveys; it will, however, be connected by other roads, already in course of construction with sections of the country north and south of that line. The work having once been undertaken by the government will no doubt be presend with all the energy that the interests of the country require and an unlimited command of means will justify.

PUTTING NEW HEADS ON TO OLD APPLE TREES

There are many old seeding orchards, or orchards containing grafted fruit, that on trial has not been found auted to the climate or soil where they are planted. The tops of these may be easily replaced by better varie-ies of fruit, by cutting off the branches and

During the past winter we made a call on gentleman, an amateur in the way of fruit. residing in Frankfort, where he showed us two apple trees that were upwards of fifty years old. In order to improve the quality If the fruit some five or six years ago, he had all the branches removed at once—cuiting them of where they were two or three inches inches in diameter. This was done early in the spring. Each branch put out several new and and vigorous shoots, one of each of these preserved, and the following spring were grafted with different varieties of apples. When this operation was performed the trees showed evident signs of maturity and approaching decay. But by this operaold trees present young, healthy, well formed heads, affording in fruitful seasons abundant

crops of fair fruit By giving the branches from the old stamps a year's growth before they are grafted, they afford a more suitable size for grafting, and the circulation being more vigorous in the young than in the old stumps, as usually grafled a much better head is formed, while the grafts are less liable to be broken off by the

In reviving old orchards in this way it is important to manure the ground well with stable manure, wood ashes, &c. and give it a thorough cultivating for a year or two, which will much improve the size and quality of the fruit,— Louisville Courier.
