WORKING OF THE ATLANTIC CABLE. The London Morning Post gives the following interesting account of the working of

the telegraph:
The slowness of the signals through the
Atlantic telegraph cable does not depend on the retardation of electricity in passing through the length of the wire. If the wire were suspended in the air there would be no difficulty in transmitting as rapidly as the in-struments could be worked; but when the wire is covered with gutta percha, and im-mersed in water, it retains the electricity, and the charge once communicated to the wire requires time for its discharge.

The first signal made is transmitted almost instantaneously through the conducting wire to the instrument at the other end; but the wire does not readily part with the charge, and the electricity it retains prevents the ef-fect of a second signal from being perceived on the distant instrument. This peculiar effect begins to be perceived in an immersed wire at a distance of fifty miles, and increases in force as the distance increased so that, at 200 miles, communication by Morse's tele-graph would be impracticable, unless means were adopted to counteract the detaining influence of the external conductor. When the Hague was laid down, the difficulty of transmission through a submerged wire be-Morse instrument then employed would not act in consequence. But the difficulty was shortly overcome by discharging the wire after each signal, which was done by sending an electrical current in the reverse direction. With the needle telegraph the effect had been scarcely perceived, for in the ordinary working of that instrument the electrical currents are continually reversed; but with the re-cording instrument, in which the electricity operates always in the same direction, a special arrangement for reversing the current becomes essentially necessary. How far that arrangement only will suffice to clear the wire has not yet been determined, but it seems evident that it is sufficient for the Atlantic

If the difficulty that has arisen were owing to the retardation of the electric current, there would be little hope of its being overcome, for the natural velocity of electricity could not be increased; but when it is known that the slowness with which one signal follows another is attributable to a peculiar condition of the wire which has been effectually neutralized, by special arrangements, for a distance of two or three hundred miles, i may be reasonably expected that other contrivances may be adopted that will overcome the difficulty, even across the Atlantic.

TELEGRAPHIC INSTRUMENTS.

As the Electricians are supposed to be experimenting at Trinity Bay and Valentia with the various recording instruments in use, it is of interest to know what are the chief differences between them.

The Morse instrument, in common use from the first in this country, transmits mes-sages by the alternate breaking and re-connocting of the electric current. The current nllowed to flow a moment produces a dot, if a little longer a line. The operator taps on a single key, and the messages are recorded by an alphabet composed of combinations of hues and dots, thus: - - - - hands of an expert the speed of this instru-

character and condition of the animals. They will not award premiums for Bulls, Cows or Heifers which were fattened for the butcher; the object being to have superior animals of this kind for breeding.

Judges of fat cattle will give particular attention to animals submitted for examination-those are the best cattle having the greatest weight in the smallest superfices, all other things being equal.

Judges will in all cases withhold premiums

where the animal is not worthy, though there be no competition. Exhibitors must become members of the Society, and have their articles and animals brought within the euclosure by Wednesday at 4 o'clock, P. M., so that they may be

suitably arranged for examination on Thursday morning. Animals and articles entered for exhibition must have cards attached, with the number as entered at the Secretary's office. The Executive Committee will not insure any erhibitor who neglects these requirements that his or her articles will be examined by the Judges; while it is intended to secure proper notice to all who have articles placed on exhibition, justice will first be meted out to those who comply with the instructions.
