It is told here of Soulouque that, at his cronation, he went to the church in a public seck, brought from Paris, and on which the comber was still retained. In like manner ne ordered an agent here to purchase bim, for his body-guard of sixty men, a complete unit of uniforms suitable for such a corps d elite. But at this time Soulouque was not yet a triple millionaire; in fact he was rather short of funds, and the check-placed at the agent's orders did not permit him any extravagances in the selection of the uniforms -To tell the truth, he bought the uniforms at the Temple, from amongst old uniforms representing every epoch from the revolution d '89 down to the present time. When these were selected the money was nearly exhausted, and as Soulouque had ordered that the hats should bear a stamped brass plate, and as new ones, expressly stamped, would cost too much money, the agent bought for a few sous, at a restaurant, a sufficient number of sarding box plates, stamped with the name of the preparer, with full details of address, Ar., and stuck them on the hats. Those who saw the first parade of this life guard at Portan Prince declare that the brass plates were the better part of the costume, since these were uniform, while the conts were as variegaird as the number of men that bore them.

That was a proud day for Soulouque, but he soon learned other habits and acquired other tattes. From this very modest beginmonarcus that ever robbed an oppressed people. He had a crown and sceptre made at Paris from designs by Premont Mourice, which cost \$25,000. THE ATLANTIC TELEGRAPH.

The London Times says that scarcely a night passes without some one of either House of Parliament rising to put questions to ministers, touching the arrangements which have been or are to be made with regard to the Atlantic Telegraph. The responses to these inquiries do not seem to be al-ways made in the best humor; and it is intimated that when any statement involving facts and figures is made, more mistakes are committed in one night than could be found nor is as follows: in its own columns for a month.

The Atlantic Telegraph Company, some time ago, it mentions, made application to the Government to have the same terms of guarantee extended to them as were slready extended to the Red Sea Company, namely, a guarantee of 41 per cent, on the new capi tal; but this application met with a direct negative from the Treasury, and upon the ground that "the Government were resolved to give no further guarantees which were not made conditional upon the wire being laid and kept in working order."

If no other companies were in the field and unconditional guarantees were required to as-sure the money market that a fresh attempt to cross the Atlantic would not fail, as was the case last year, then the Atlantic Company would have a claim upon the Government which it would be bound to recognize.

The result of the attempts made last year have shown conclusively that, with due precantions and a properly constructed cable, a wire may be laid between England and America with as much certainty of success as a railway bridge can be carried across the Thames. The confidence inspired by the operations and achievements of the Company last year is apparent, masmuch as the leading submarine cable makers are now willing to contract for the successful submergence of an Atlantic wire, taking all the risk of loss or damage upon themselves. Another evidence going to establish the feasibility of laying a wire scross the Atlantic is, that two distinct companies were organized for the same purpose in less than a month after the late cable had come to the useless, though their routes were different. The existence of these companies, no doubt, influenced the Government n declining to afford unconditional aid to the Atlantic Company.

The Government, however, offered to give a guarantee of 8 per cent, on the entire capi-tal of £435,000, as long as the wire continued in working order, and if its profits do not exceed that sum. But this offer is coupled with a restriction to the effect that the Company should give up the monopely which had been granted to them for fifty years, and be confined to landing submarine cables only on the

crast of Newfoundland. with the expectation of making 85 per cent. the monopoly, and also hints that there are other conditions than those already named, spon which the S per cent, would be granted

The old cable remains without any change. The Liverpool Times in referring to the Atlantic Cable, states that in the House of Lords, Lord Stanley expressed the hope that in any contract entered into by the Government for the conveyance of messages by telegraph, clauses might be inserted authorizing Secretary of State, by his warrant, to take possession of the telegraph, and keep it for a public service as long as that service might require it.

Explosion of a Locomotive!-Faigurest. AND FATAL ACCIDENT .- On Wednesday morning, about half past 4 o'clock, the boder of the locomotive "Perkiomen," belonging to the Reading Railroad Company, exploded in the vicinity of the Falls of Schuylkill, Philadelphia, with terribly fatal results. The engine, which was a very large and powerful one-one of the largest coal-burners owned by the Company-had just stopped at the full house at the ralls Bridge on the West side of the Schnylkitl, with a long train of coal cars attached to it, in order to wait for another locomotive, to push the train around the curve at that point, when the boiler examong the kills like the discharge of a battery.
