Farmers' Department.

Work for June.

Coss -This crop requires the special care of the cultivator during the month of June. As soon as the "stand" is secure from the worm and bird, thin to two or three plants to the hill, according to the strength of your land. As we have repeatedly arged before,

let the working of the crop be done early. After planting at proper distance on ground properly prepared and manared, the crop should be quickly worked and carly let alone. There is more loss to the erop by working after barvest than by all other disasters to-gether. Think of a man working and spending all proper means to get a beautiful, luxuriant growth, and then, at the very time when it is most in need of ample supplies of nutriment, and when a thousaud mouths are seeding it from every source, a marderous implement is put in to tare up and destroy these channels of supply. For these purposes shallow cultivation is sufficient, and the ordinary corn cultivator the proper im plement. Should the grass, at any time, get the start of you, the mould board will be necessary to subdue it.

POTATOES -- We ventured the opinion last month, in opposition to the very general ad-vice upon the subject, that the best time for planting, for the main crop of potatoes, is not before the middle of June. As the sun has much power at that time, there are some cantions to be observed in planting, to insure the coming up of the seed. The plantings should be prepared some weeks in advance of the time of planting, and spread out where they will heal without being heated ; unless you prefer planting whole potatoes of small size. The potatoes should not be exposed in the field, by being allowed to romain in the bot sun, in baskets or othewise. They should be dropped in the fresh farrow immediately after it is opened, and covered without delay Attention to these suggestion will insure the regular coming up of the crop, unless the potato has been damaged previously. As soon as the plants begin to grow, run the harrow over the ground, to break the crust, and destroy such weeds or grass as may be germinating. One or two seasonable workings of this sort, will save much hoe work. HAY MAKING.—The clover and orchard grass will be fit for hay making this month. The proper time of cutting is a point of much importance. It is suggested that the in stincts of bees and other insects are a safe guide for us. They suck the blossoms when the sugar is developed in the plant, and indicate the period when we may most profitably put in the scythe. Professor Horsford de-termined by experiment, that clover cut when the heads just begin to appear, produced only 0,80 per cent, of sugar ; but when fully developed, produced 1.15 per cent, of sugar-very near fifty per cent, more than that cut first.





POTATO BEER RISINGS .-- 1 have seen a great many pieces about making good bread, and I have tried a great many ways, and none I like so well as with potato beer Take a double handfull of potatoes and boil them soft, and mash them, put them through a sieve, put a gallon of water with them, then put it in a stone jar, and after it is cool enough so as not to scald the yeast, add to it a pint of good yeast. Do this the evening before you want to bake. If it gets too cold through the night, set your jar in a kettle of hot water in the morning, and stir it till it is warm enough to set your rising. Have your flour warm and ready, then take your beer and set the rising, atir it as thick as your over and set an iron spoon or paddle. It will rise in half an hour, or at the longest an hour. When you knead it, add to it a quart of warm milk or water, knead it well, and let it rise sgain, then take it eut in loaves, have your oven ready, aud bake as usual-[R. A. R., in Ohio] Cultivator.
