The Democratic nominating convention Wolf. met at the Court House, in this place, on Monday last, and as a necessary consequence, candidates and politicians were thick and plenty. That many were disappointed where only a few could be chosen, was not unexpected, and we heard a number condemn the present system of conducting primary elec. tions. When we predicted this state of things, when this system was adopted, we received neither compliments nor thanks from many who have since felt the truth of our predictions and the force of our arguments.

Edward being a stout six footer, took the responsibility of constituting himself the judge, having pocketed the papers as soon as the polls were closed. The convention, however, admitted Mr. Shindel.

There was some little surprise manifested at the rapid increase of the Democracy in some of the districts in the forks.
