IMPORTANT FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, June 28. A young damsel of eighteen years, has been errested by the Michigan Regiment. She gave her name as Alice Kingsbury, and said she was a native of Washington City. Upon her person was found an accurate diagram of the fortifications on Shorter's Hill the position of the guns being marked, as well as the weak points. She had been permitted to remain in the vicinity for some days, but suspicion being aroused, was arrested. She

is in close contody.

Among the other Paymasters who are now attending to their duties, much to the delight of the soldiers, who for so many weeks have been out of funds, is the Hun. David Taggart of your State. The first official duty assigned to him was the payment of the Thirteenth Regiment of New York Volunteers, Colonel Quimby, stationed at Camp Union, a mile or two west of Fort Corcoran, on the way to Bull's Cross Roads and Palls Church.

Washington, June 28 .- Yesterday afternoon, Captain Ward, of the U. S. Freeborn, landed twenty-five men in boats at Matthias Point, Va., about forty miles below Washington, on the Potomac river. The futention was to erect a battery to command the Point. This was on the Virginia side of the river, and the place had been previously reconneitred, as it was thought there might

been a Rebel force there.

The following is believed to be the correct version of the engagement :- It appears the Freeborn was off the Point reconnoilering, and discovered indications of a movement for crecting batteries at the Point by Rebel

On Wednesday night last Captain Ward sent up to the Pawner, at Aquis Creek, deening Captain Owens to send bim a reinforcement of the boats' crows. Two small uutters, with their crews, were therefore sent down to the Freeborn, under Lieutenant Chaplin, and with them Captain Ward despatched a boat and crew from the Freeborn, numbering in all from thirty to forty

Lientenant Chaplin yesterday morning effected a landing, and succeeded in driving in the Rebel pickets. Finding preparations for the erection of a Rebel battery there, it was determined to throw up breastworks and mount guns thereon, to give the enemy a warm reception should they attack the

Accordingly, men were set to work, under cover of the Freeborn's guns, at throwing up sandbag bresstworks, and succeeded in working four hours and a half, getting their works completed about five o'clock in the evening. They then went to their boats, intending

to go on board of the Freeborn for guns to mount on the works, when at the moment of embarking, they were surprised by a force of the Rebels, estimated at from a thousand to bitsen hundred strong, who poured a heavy and continuous fire of musketry upon them

from bushes near by. Under cover of the Freeborn's guns, they reached that steamer, leaving a few of the men on shore, the guns of the Fraeborn meanwhile opening with activity and precision apparently upon the enemy, who were concealed by underbrush. About ten shells were thrown among them but with what effect could not be seen owing to the enemy's posi-Captain Ward behaved with great coolness

standing by the guns and directing their fire, when a gunner received a wound in the thigh which disabled him. Captain Ward immediately took his place, and was sighting the gun when he received a Minie musket ball full in the breast which killed him almost instantly. The men left on shore by the boats in their retreat, swam out to the Freeborn, one of them carrying on his back a wounded comrade named Bess, who had received four musket balls, and was thought mortally wounded. Jack Williams, Coxswain of the third cutter, received a flesh wound while waving the Stars and Stripes, which he had

carried in his hand during the whole affair. behaving most gallantly under the bottest lire. The American ensign, which he unreasingly waved, was pierced with bineteen mus-Only three of the men in the bonta were wounded. The only life lost was that of the gallaut Ward, who, the moment the enemy was discovered, blew the signal for the boat's

crews to come on board, and instantly opened on the foe with his heavy guns. A slave belonging to Dr. Howe approached the shore with a white shirt on a pole and getting on board the Freeborn, informed Cuptain Ward that the enemy were ambuscaded in an underbrush near by, one thousand strong. Still the work was continued and

Washington, June 30, 1861.

AFFAIRS ON THE UPPER POTOMAC. Probable Advance of General Patterson's Column.

HAGERSTOWN, Friday Might, June 28. Major Doubleday saw a body of Rebel troops clustered around the edge of the woods upon the high hill opposite Williams. port, and threw a 24 pound shot at them this E. Y. BRIGHT & SON. afternoon. They scampered over the crest of the hill at more than "double quick."

Orders for the march of the Reserve Guard. consisting of the First Wisconsin and the Eleventh Pennsylvania, were issued this afternoon, and also to McMullin's Independent Rangers. From the fact that this corps is the especial body guard of Gen. Patterson. it is presumed that he, too, moves his head-

quarters southward.
Lieut, Elder, of Major Doubleday's command, learned from the party who brought the flag of truce yesterday, that the Viggini ons are forced to feed their horses exclusively upon corn; they have no old hay, and ac-knowledge that not only provender, but provisions of all kinds, are very scarce. They said that everything in the valley of Virginia

is literally exhausted.
It is believed that our own troops will cross the Potomac partly at Williamsport and partly at Sheppard's Ford, nine miles below. If they cross at the latter point and push rapidly forward they may succeed in capturing at least three hundred Secresion cavairy.
The troops are all inspirited at the idea of

a forward movement, but their enthusiasm is semewhat chilled by the fear that they will be marched ten or hiteen miles and be halted again for weeks.
Two regiments-one Alabamians and the

other Mississippians—reached Harper's Forry this morning, and destroyed the balance of the railroad trestle work. They also came over to the Maryland shore and seized all the boats they could get, either breaking them up or taking them over the river.

All the Union men of Harper's Ferry were again driven out. Alvey, the Secessionist leader, who was arrested here ten days ago. leaves to morrow for Fort Meilenry, by way of Chambersburg and Marrisburg. trunk is already packed, and he is under a goard of McMullin's Rangers. Any attempt at a rescue would prove hazardous in the

I have just learned that McMullin's Rangers encamp to morrow night at Sheppards' own, and some regiments will be thrown forward with them. The headquarters of General Patterson will be advanced further southward within a day or two.

HAGERSTOWN, June 30 .- The following despatch is official :-- HEADQUARTERS, DEF'T. OF PENNA.)

HAGERSTOWN, June 30, 1861. General Orders, No. 29 - Tae Commanding General has the satisfaction to appounce to the troops a second victory over the insurgents by a small party of Indiana Volunteers, under Colonel Wallace, on the 26th inst.-Thirteen mounted men attached to the regiment attacked forty one insurgents killing eight and chazing the rest two miles. On their return, with seventeen captured horses. they were attacked by seventy-five of the enemy, and fell back to a strong position, which they held till dark, when they returned to camp, with the loss of one man killed and one wounded. In the last skirmish, a Cap tain, two Lieutenants, and a large number were wounded.

The commanding General desires to bring to the attention of the officers and men of his command the courage and conduct with ONE which this gallant little band of comparatively rap troops met the emergency by turning on an enemy so largely superior in numbers. chastising them severely, and gathering in retreat the fruits of victory. WASHINGTON, June 30. Information has been brought by Judge Shelby, a distinguished Union man, just arrived from Texas, that a movement is on foot to separate western Texas from the rest of the State, and erect it juto a Union State .-It is settled largely by Germans, and the German press without exception, favor the measure. The Union party there, already very strong, is rapidly increasing. Secret well on their march through Washington, Union associations have been formed, and to county. General Carpen, who has distin-guished himself by his opposition to the rebelion, has been nominated as an unconditional ted States. Gen. Carpen has been for some time at the head of a body of Union men in western Texas, and it is reported of him that, with about two hundred Union men, he lately routed more than twice that number of rebels. This movement, and the fact that the loyal citizens there, too, are arming to resist the usurpation of their State government, forthe South Carolina conspiracy.


