MEETING OF CONGRESS IN EXTRA SESSION.

ELECTION OF MR. GROW OF PENNSYLVANIA, SPEAKER. EMERSON ETHERIDGE OF TENNESSEE ELECTED CLERK.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, July 4. The Senate was called to order by the Vice President at 12 o'clock.

The following Senators were present: Messrs. Anthony, Bayard, Bingham Breckinridge, Chandler, Clark, Colamer, Cowan, DeLoach, Fessenden, Ford, Foster, Grimes, Hale, Harlan, Harris, Howe, Johnson (Tenn.), Kennedy, King, Lee, (Ind.), Latham, Morrill, Nesmith, Pearce, Peck, Powell, Salisbury, Sherman, Simmons, Sumner, Ten Eyck, Thompson, Trumbull, Wade, Wilkeson and Wilson.

Mr. Grimes (Iowa) presented the credentials of James S. Lane, Senator elect from Kansas, who took the oath.

Mr. Doolittle (Wis.) presented the credentials of S. C. Pomeroy, Senator elect from Kansas.

Mr. Trumbull (Ill.) presented the credentials of Orelle H. Browning Senator elect from Illinois, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Senator Douglas.

Mr. Latham (Cal.) presented the credentials of James A. McDougal, Senator elect from California.

The oath was administered to the last three Senators. On drawing lots, Mr. Pomeroy drew the long term for Kansas.

Mr. Hale (N. H.) offered a resolution that the Senate proceed to the election of Sergeant at Arms. Laid over.

Mr. Hale offered a resolution, asking the Secretary of the Navy for a copy of all contracts. Passed.

Mr. Wilson (Mass.) gave notice that he should, to-morrow, offer the following bills:— A bill to ratify and confirm certain acts of the President, for the suppression of insurrection and rebellion.

A bill to authorize the employment of volunteers for enforcing the laws, and protecting public property.

A bill to increase the present military establishment of the United States.

A bill providing for the better organization of the military establishment.

A bill to promote the efficiency of the army.

A bill for organizing a volunteer militia force, to be called the National Guard of the United States.

The Clerk read the resignation of Asbury Dickson, the venerable Secretary of the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Fessenden (Mr.) the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The Clerk called the names of those here to be elected as members from South Carolina, Arkansas and Florida.

Mr. McClure objected to Mr. A. T. Thayer being called as member from Oregon, and sent up the protest of Mr. Shield. This subject was passed over for the present.

Mr. Vallandigham said he would, at the proper time, present a question of privilege in the form of a resolution, that Messrs. Marton, Blair and Curtis, claiming seats in this House, having been sworn into the military service of the United States, and holding commissions, are constitutionally disqualified from being members of this House.

Mr. Blair said he had never been sworn into the service of the United States, and therefore Mr. Vallandigham's facts were wrong as to himself.

Mr. Vallandigham said, of course, after this explanation, he would not include the gentleman. (Applause in galleries.)

Mr. Richard objected to the resignation of Mr. Daily as the delegate from Nebraska. The list of members having been called, the Clerk announced that one hundred and fifty-seven members had answered to their names.

The election of a Speaker was now in order.

Mr. Coffey said—Mr. Clerk, before the balloting commences, I desire to state to my fellow members that I am not a candidate for the Speakership.

Mr. Hickman nominated Francis P. Blair, Jr., of Missouri, saying that that gentleman had inaugurated the war policy in Missouri, which had elicited the approbation of every loyal American citizen. (Applause in the galleries.)

Mr. McClure wished now to put a stop to such disorders in the galleries.

The Clerk said he had no power to prevent order.

Mr. Vallandigham thought an appeal from the Clerk would have the proper effect.

Mr. Stevens, in nominating Hon. G. A. Grow, (Pa.) for Speaker, said he would not follow the bad lead of his colleague (Mr. Hickman) by going into a eulogy of Mr. Grow's character, or by probed not saying anything against his opponent. (Laughter.)

Mr. Curtis, in alluding to Mr. Vallandigham's question of privilege, said he was elected by the people of Iowa as a member of Congress; he was also elected a Colonel of a volunteer regiment from that State, and for those marks of confidence his constituents were responsible.

The House then proceeded to vote for Speaker.

There being no choice, Mr. Blair said it was unnecessary to have another vote, as he would come delay in the organization. He begged leave to decline being a candidate, and requested his friends to change their votes on this ballot in order to an election at once.

Voices were then changed from Blair to Grow, and the following was announced as the result:—

Whole number of votes 159 Grow, 99; Blair, 11; Crittenden, 12; the rest scattering.

The Hon. G. A. Grow, the Speaker elect, was escorted to the chair by Messrs. Blair and Richardson.

He made an address, when the oath of office was administered to him by Mr. Washburne, (Ill.)

The House then proceeded to a vote as follows:—

Mr. Etheridge was declared elected.

SENATE.

Mr. Hale, of New Hampshire, called up his resolution offered yesterday to proceed to the election of Sergeant at-Arms of the Senate.

On the first ballot 41 votes were cast, as follows:—

Mr. George F. Brown was declared elected. He appeared and took the usual oath.

Mr. Hale offered a resolution that the salary of Mr. McNaair be paid till December. Laid over.

Mr. Salisbury, of Delaware, asked the Senator from New Hampshire, if Mr. McNaair was a worthy officer, why he had been reno at all?

Mr. Hale said if the Senator would tell him why the State of Delaware removed Mr. Congress, and sent him (Salisbury) here he would be glad to answer.

Mr. Chandler, of Michigan, gave notice

that he should, to-morrow introduce a bill to confiscate the property of all the Governors of the States, the members of the Legislatures, judges of the courts, and all the military officers above the rank of Lieutenant, who shall take up arms against the Government of the United States, or aid to abst treason against the Government; and that all such persons be forever disqualified from holding any office of honor, emolument, or trust in the Government; such property to be applied to restore to the Union men, in the rebel States, any losses they may have suffered.

ANOTHER BATTLE IN MISSOURI

GOVERNOR JACKSON IN THE FIELD.

Ten Thousand Rebels Attack Fifteen Hundred Federal Troops.

KANSAS CITY, July 9. We are indebted to the Kansas Journal for a copy of the Fort Scott Democrat of the 7th inst. It contains an account of a battle between the Missouri State troops under Gov. Jackson and ten to thirteen thousand and a half Federal troops, on the 7th inst.

Our informant says that on Wednesday 3d inst., the State troops left Rupert's Point and moved south to Murray's, six miles on Friday morning, at six o'clock, by break camp and marched south in the direction of Carthage. They were met by Col. Seigel with 1,500 men who immediately gave him battle.

At the crossing of Day Fork, our lines were very near being broken, when by a timely arrival of two hundred Union men, from Shool Creek they crossed with a loss of five killed and two mortally wounded. The battle continued, the United States troops unfortunately fighting and retreating until dark, when they reached Carthage, having crossed Buck Branch and Spring River on the way.

The fighting was all done with the artillery. Col. Seigel retreating as soon as they advanced.

The loss on Jackson's side was very great. Our informant says he counted over 70 or 80 wounded on the field and in the houses by the wayside.

The loss on the side of the State troops cannot be less than from 300 to 500.

Gov. Jackson announces his intention of fortifying Carthage until Price and McCulloch arrive from Arkansas with reinforcements when he will not on the offensive and enforce the laws of the State.

SECOND DISPATCH.

A citizen of this place has just arrived, having left Sherman, Jasper county, at daylight this morning. He states that after leaving Carthage Col. Seigel moved two miles southeast of the town, where he encamped for the night, his command badly cut up.

His loss is variously estimated at from three hundred to one thousand, and that of the accessories from one thousand to two thousand killed and wounded. Col. Brown with three thousand troops from Springfield, is said to have joined him. Major Sturgis is north of Osage; and Gen. Lyon, at last accounts, was at Warsaw on his way south.

On the day of the battle Gen. McCulloch and Gen. Price arrived at Neuss twenty miles south of Carthage, with ten thousand men. A guard of two hundred led by Gen. Single was surrounded and taken prisoners.

Mr. report says that all were murdered, and another report that a small party of them were killed. McCulloch sent forward 2,000 men to assist Jackson. He expects 5,000 additional troops from Arkansas.

LATE NEWS FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE GREAT EASTERN.

QUEBEC, July 6.—The steamship Great Eastern from England, arrived with troops, bringing Liverpool dates to the 27th ult.

Lord Chancellor Campbell died suddenly from the rupture of a blood vessel.

The Sultan of Turkey died on the 25th, and was succeeded by his brother Abdul Aziz Khan. Everything was quiet at Constantinople.

Sir J. Ferguson, in the House of Commons, condemned the sending of reinforcements to Canada, and Mr. D'Israeli also thought the Government was incurring serious loss by so doing.

Lord Palmerston defended the act of the Government as a usual precautionary measure of all Governments in the immediate vicinity of hostilities. The step indicated no distrust of the faith of the Northern States—no want of confidence in the Canadians.

The war was fitly begun, because reinforcements can only be sent to Canada in the summer.

A recognition of the Kingdom of Italy by France, has been formally announced.

The Conard steamer Scotia has been successfully launched.

The Hon. Mr. Allison, in a letter to Cassius M. Clay, contends that the American Constitution is a failure, and recommends a national church and monarchy as a remedy.

The confederation in London, briefly telegraphed by the Press, was the most disastrous for generations. Immense piles of property were lost, the Harper, because reinforcements can only be sent to Canada in the summer.

The Pope was ill, but improving at the last accounts.

Agitation in Hungary was reported to be increasing.

The Prince and Princess Frederick Wilhelm had arrived in England on a visit to the Queen.

A MARRIED COMPLIMENT.—The Philadelphia North-western pays the following well merited compliment to an indefatigable officer and worthy gentleman:—

"Mr. Thomas A. Scott, Vice President of the Pennsylvania Railroad, returned from Virginia yesterday, to this city. Mr. Scott has been appointed by the Government to reconstruct the almost demolished railroads in Virginia over which the Federal troops and munitions are to be carried into the rebel country. When the first rush of soldiers found their way to the Pennsylvania Railroad, Mr. Scott erected a line of telegraph to the Governor's rooms at Harrisburg, and there sat night and day, with water in hand, superintending the running of the trains, exhibiting powers of endurance literally astonishing to moderate a physique. He is now in charge of all the railroad lines in possession of the Government that lead to Washington. The work of reconstructing the damaged roads is so rapidly progressing that the rebels are already retreating to the coast, and that many of the Union men in the present crisis, has rendered more valuable aid to Gov. Scott than his Philadelphia demise."
