INTERESTING FROM CAIRO. Town of Commerce, Mo., Taken and Retaken

-Retreat of the Rebel Forces. St. Louis, Aug. 20 .- The town of Commerce, Missouri, forty unles above Caro, bereturned, which was taken on Sunday and a battery AGENTSplanted by the Secessionists, was retaken last night by 500 troops sent down from Cape. Girardesa, by order of Gen. Fremont.

The Rebels made no stand, but retreated with their battery on the approach of our troops. Their force was about 150 infantry and the same number of cavalry.

A Midnight Engagement at Charleston, Mo .-The Rebels Routed.

CAIRO, Aug. 20th .- An engagement took place last night at 12 o'clock, at Charleston, between the Federal force, about two bundred and fifty strong, and a Rebel force of about six or seven hundred men.

The Federal troops consisted of a portion of the Twenty second Illinois Regiment, under command of Colonel Dougherty, accompanied by Lieut. Colonel Rawson, of the Eleventh Hilmois Regiment. The Rebels were commanded by Colonel Hunter, of Jeff.

Thompson's army.
The Federal force was victorious, completely routing the Rebels, killing forty and taking seventeen prisoners. The loss on our side was one killed, viz:-Wm. T. Starp, of Company A.
