Brattont, S. C., July 21, 1862.

Dran Willyfir:—Some evil disposed persons, or those who have no regard for the truth, have written home stories that certain members of our company, nayelf and Captain Gobin included, had been "engaged in rioting," odisoboyed orders, "killed a citizen," &c., and consequently were to be shot, or other punishment inflicted according to the decision of a court-martial. Such reports are very unpleasant to us, who are far away, offering our lives as a sacrifice for the honor of our insulted flag, and have means to refute the foul reports until stander has done its work; while parents and friends are left to an uncertainty, and succes justs of the sympothizers are eagorily let loose to hurt the feelings of those who are left unprotected by their sons who are doing refer part in putting down this rebellion. For the future, it is the wish of our Company, that the friends at home will listen to no more such stories, and believe no reports, unless duly authenticated.

ral States, WAR DEPARTMENT, WASHINGTON, D. C., ? August 4, 1862.

First-That a draft of 300,000 militia be immediately called into the service of the United States, to serve for nine months, unless sooner discharged. The Secretary of War will assign the quotas to the States and establish regulations for the draft.

Second-That if any State shall not by the 15th of August furnish its quota of the additional 300,000 volunteers authorized by law, the difficiency of volunteers in that State wiit also be made up by special draft from the militia. The Secretary of War will establish regulations for this purpose.

Third-Regulations will be prepared by the War Department and presented to the President with the object of securing the promotion of officers of the army and volunteers for meritorious and distinguished services, and of preventing the nomination or appointment in the military service of inompetent or unworthy officees. lations will also provide for ridding the service of such incompetent persons as now hold commissions.
