THE NEW RECruits.—The following
sensible advice from another journal, we
would commend to the attention of those
intending to enter the army :

"Nine-tenths of the mortality in the army,
as the public now well understand, is caused
by disease not battle; and of that mortality
the Commission assure us that three-fourths
may be saved by incorporating the new levy
into the existing regiments. This is a matter
for recruits to consider well. The opinion
tallies with the judgment of those who have
had opportunities for observation; but it is
now placed among the points which are to
be held as demonstrated. The recruit who
is careful of life, or of health, or of comfort,
will take his place in an old regiment, rather
than among those who are as inexperienced
as himself."
