CHINESE MEAT.—To one gallon of water,
take 1/2 pound of salt, 1/2 pound of sugar,
1/2 ounce of saltpetre, 1/2 ounce of potash.
In this ratio the pickles to be immersed to any
quantity desired. Let these be boiled to-
gether, until all the dirt from the sugar rises
to the top and is skimmed off. Then throw
it into a tub to cool, and when cold, pour it
over your beef or pork, to remain the usual
time, say four or five weeks. The meat
must be well covered with pickles, and
should not be allowed to get dry. For any
other pickles, use the same recipe, but
omit the saltpetre, which removes all the
surface blood, &c., leaving the meat fresh and
clean. Some omit boiling the pickle, and find it
to answer well; though the operation of boiling
purifies the pickle by throwing off all the
dirt always to be found in salt and sugar.

THE GAMBLER.—As late in November as
the weather will admit of it, turn up, spine
deep, the beds or ground intended for vegeta-
bles next year. Let the soil remain in
blocks or lumps as it is thrown up. The
action of the frost during the winter will
pulverize it, destroy many of the insects,
and when it is again dug in the spring, will
be a garden full, the soil will resolve itself into
a rich loam. Gardens with heavy soils
will especially be greatly benefited by this
process.—Germantown Telegraph.
