The popular feeling is in favor of Prince Alfred, of England, as king, continues.

A prize fight for the English Championship between Mace and King, took place on the 26th ult. After fighting twenty-one rounds, mostly in favor of Mace, King knocked his opponent insensible. Mace could not come to time, and King was declared the victor.

GREAT BRITAIN.—An extraordinary general meeting of the Atlantic Telegraph Company is called for the 12th of December, for the purpose of considering a proposition for the issue of £300,000 new capital, in preference shares of £5 each, bearing eight per cent. interest, guaranteed by the British Government in the event of success, and any further profits to be first applied to pay four per cent. on the old capital, and the surplus to an equal division between the old and new, and the formation of a reserve fund.

GERMANY.—The Greek question continued to be the most prominent topic.

Great demonstrations continued to be made in various parts of Greece in favor of placing Prince Alfred, of England, upon the throne.

It was rumored that the Russian Government intended to address a communication to the English Government, seriously objecting to Prince Alfred being considered a candidate for the Greek throne.

The French represent that twelve English war vessels have assembled at Piermont, but the London Globe pronounces the statement utterly devoid of foundation.

BELGIUM.—The Belgian Parliament has voted that half a million francs of the appropriation for the public works be applied to the relief of its distressed cotton operatives.

ITALY.—The Italian Chamber of Deputies continued to debate the Rome question.—Among other propositions adopted was one that the Parliamentary Session of 1863 should assemble at Naples.

James Buchanan and the United States Senate.

"The movements to make ex-President Buchanan the next United States Senator are the most ridiculous and impudent. The indecency of Buchanan involved us in this war. From Kentucky.

Sunbury, Dec. 15.
