The coal sent by Railroad this week is 67,427 tons—by Canal 39,294 tons—for the week 103,211 ton against 93,389 tons for the corresponding week last year.

The shipments from this region are very heavy this week. This was caused by the proposed advance in the price of freight and tolls of 50 cents a ton, which took place on the 1st of June.

There is a turnout in different parts of the Region, the men demanding \$1 a week additional for laborers, and 10 cents per wagon additional for miners. This turnout is ill-advised, and cannot be sustained.

Of the many ways to help treason, probably the most is embodied in the following printed in a Copperhead paper, the Bedford Gazette:

"At the present writing (Monday) the result of Grant's campaign against Richmond remains in doubt. Already he had lost as many men as composed McLellan's entire army when that General marched up the Peninsula. The loss of the Federal army according to telegraphic reports cannot fall much short of 100,000 men, killed, wounded, and missing. There has been about thirteen days of fighting, including the small battles fought by Gen. Butler; which would average the loss at about 3,000 per day."

**Mr. Keen's Estate.**—The estate of the late Richard Keen of Minersville, is appraised at \$1,400,000. His personal property including his collieries, is worth \$700,000. His estate is more valuable than was at first supposed.

**12 A LIVE CUPBOARD FOR THE SANITARY FAIR.—We saw at the Adams Express office on Monday morning last a new box, containing a genuine copperhead, directed to Mr. Trotter, Philadelphian for the Sanitary Fair, now open for exhibition. The casket was taken in the neighborhood of the coal mines near Shamokin, and furnished from that place. He was picked up very quiet and dead, evidently "down in the mouth," in being then submerged and confined in his miniature "tub." But the Express agent having opened a bundle of unprinted papers, the "Philadelphia Age," and having laid several copies on his prison, he began to talk, and soon showed that he was alive, if not kicking, ready for a fight. He was captured by Capt. Van Gaskin.**
