## Local Affairs.

A convention composed of some of the Clergy of the Episcopal Church, was held at this place on Tuesday evening and continued until Friday morning.

IMPORTANT TO TAX PAYERS.—By a recent Act of Assembly, the abatement of 5 per cent. heretofore allowed to confinees on the amount of all state taxes paid into the State Treasury prior to the 1st of September in any year, has been repealed; and in its stead, a penalty of 5 per cent. will be added on all state taxes that remain unpaid on and after the 1st of July, to those in the duplicate against each delinquent tax paid in at least at that date. It will therefore be even that the prompt payment of state taxes will now be equivalent to a saving of 5 per cent. to all our tax paying citizens—a matter of considerable importance to those who are rated high on the tax lists.
