THE NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION.—The premium list for the thirty-fourth annual fair of Northumberland county, which will be held at Milton on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, the 19th, 20th and 21st days of September, has been published. If the weather should prove unfavorable on the first day of the fair, it will be postponed until the first pleasant day thereafter, and will continue open for three successive days.—The committee of arrangements, who are to see to the erection of the necessary buildings for the fair, are Frederick Wilhelm, Dr. James McCleery and Dr. Thomas Meckley. Gen. D. C. Watson will act as marshal of the fair grounds. The agricultural address will be delivered by S. P. Wolverson, Esq., of Sunbury, on the second day of the fair, at one o'clock, P. M. Among the list of judges appointed we see the names of quite a number from this place and immediate vicinity.

SHAMOKIN IRONS.—We take the following item from the "Herald," of last week: "On last Wednesday evening a spark from a passing locomotive, falling on the roof of Mr. Bittenbender's carriage, set it on fire. The fire was discovered before the spark. Fortunately the fire was promptly extinguished. We are glad that we were thus saved from a fire that would have been not only a serious loss to the proprietor, but to the community, as his shops are filled with patterns of the various kinds of machinery in this region, that could not be replaced in years.
