EF CONVICTION OF A HORSE TRIEF .- At the seesion of the Montour county court, Judge Jordan, pro-siding, held at Danville tast week, John Clark, alias John Whipple, was tried and found guilty of stealing a horse, buggy and harness from J. W. Forsman, of Cooper township, Montour county, about 18 months ago. Clark was arrested about six months ago on this charge, and confined in the jall at Danville, but managed to make his escape before he could be brought to trial. After his escape the Horse Thice Detecting and Insurance Company, of that place, al-though the horse of Mr. Foreman was not insured by them, liberally offered a reward of \$100 for the re arrest of Clark. He was soon after arrested and taken back to jail. where, under the auspices of the company, he was strictly guarded so as to prevent another escape. He was convicted and sentenced to imprisonment in the Eastern Penitentiary for a term of six years and six menths. It is to be hoped that the punishment to be inflicted on the prisoner will-to some extent, check the depredations of the horse thieves in this section of our State.

BOLD ROBBERY IN SCHUYLKILL COUNTY-The Robbers enter the Office of a Colliery on Pay -We copy the following account of a daring robbe ry, near Mahanoy City, Schuylkill county, on the 16th ult., from the Pottsville Miners' Journal, of Saturday last :

The most daring robbery that ever took place in Schuylkill county, was perpetrated on Saturday last by ten men, at the office of the Boston Run Colliery, Althouse & Focht, about three miles from Mahanoy City. Saturday was pay day at the Colliery, and on the previous day Mr. George D. Althouse had arrived from Philadelphia with \$6,050 to pay the miners. On Friday evening this money was put in envelopes, as is the custom, by Mr. Benjamin Focht. During the night an attempt was made to enter the house where this mency was kept, but lights having been kept burning, the men who made the attempt desisted after opening some shutters.

About 9 o'clock on Saturday morning Mr. Focht took the money to the office and commenced paying. Shortly after Mr. Althouse and Mr. Jacob Focht, (Mr. B. Focht's father.) went to the office, where they sat talking, and when a man came in paying him. They had paid twenty-one men, and there was no one in the office except Mr. Althouse, Mr. Focht and his son, when Mr. Jacob Focht, who was looking out of a window, suddenly exclaimed, "There come four men." He had hardly uttered the exclaimation before they entered the office. One of the men Althouse & Focht, about three miles from Mahane

four men." He had hardly uttered the excession tion before they entered the office. One of the men asked for work. He was informed that there was none to give. The men then made a movement to enter inside a railing which separated the entrance by one of the robbers. Mr. Foolt, however, broke away from the man, ran out and cried for assistance. A shot was fired at him from behind, which came close to his head. At the same time a man sprang by his weight, and fell upon the rail beneath, injuring the lower part of the abdomen. Internal inflammation ensued, causing intense pain. Dr. Hunter,
of Watsontown, who attended him, was fearful that
the old gentleman could not survive the injury.

A woman who saw the occurrence screamed, and one of the robbers fired three shots at her without hitting her. The man who had Mr. Focht in charge robbed him of a gold watch and chain valued at \$200, and then compelled him to jump into a creek and lie down, firing a shot at him, which, however, passed over him. Shortly after the other robbers, nine in number, came down the road and passed on. Mr. Focht then rose, went to the house, suddied a horse, and went to Shenandoah City, where a hundred armed men were soon got together, to go

in pursuit of the robbers.

While what we have narrated was going on out-While what we have narrated was going on outside, a desperate fight took place in the office between Mr. Althouse and Mr. Jacob Focht and two
of the robbers. Mr. Althouse had succeeded in
getting his man into a corner, where he choked him
until he was black in the face. A comrade, however, came to the robber's assistance and striking
Mr. Althouse a severe blow on the head with the
butt of his revolver, knocked him to the floor senseless. Mr. Focht also had his assailant by the throat
with one hand, while with the other he held the
barrel of the robber's revolver, from which four
shots were fired while in that position, without injubarrel of the robber's revolver, from which four shots were fired white in that position, without injuring Mr. F. After Mr. Althouse fell the robbers succeeded in getting the money which was in one hundred and twenty-five envelopes, and decamped hastily, dropping sixteen of the envelopes in making their heavy exit. The amount taken was \$4,500.—During the fight shots were fired and several balls passed through Mr. Althouse's clothing. He was slightly wounded in the hip by a ball. Mr. Focht was wounded on the head by being knocked against a stove. Neither were dangerously hurt, and their wounds were soon after dressed by a surgeon. An alarm was given at the colliery by one of the employees by sounding a steam whistle. The employ-

players by sounding a steam whistle. The employces gathered quickly and pursued the robbers, but
they scattered and running into the woods which are
thick there, were soon lost to sight.

The office where this affair happened is about two
hundred and aftry yards from the colliery. The robbery took place about 11 o'clock, and the entire
transaction only occupied ten minutes. In secondary transaction only occupied ten minutes. In escaping the robbers ran in the direction of Shenandoah City Mr. Focht thinks the men were Irishmen and Cor-nishmen, and that they are an organized band under the leadership of a superior scoundrel who probably graduated in crime in one of the cities. The exe-cution was, evidently, too bold and successful for greenhorns in the business.
