REJECTED .- John R. Campbell, Esq., and Jacob Sallada, E-q., -the former as collector of Internal Revenue of the Lycoming district, and the latter as Postmaster at Williamsport,-both appointed last summer during the revess of Congress, have been rejected by the United States Senate.

Division of the Borough.—We are pleased to learn that a movement is to be made to divide this Borough into two election wards. This is absolutely necessary. The number of voters in the Borough, at this time, is estimated at about 700 .-Action in this matter should not be delayed. A North and South ward, divided by the Shamokin Valley Railroad, should be established.

A SPECIAL COURT was held in this place during the past week, commencing on Tuesday last, Judge Elwell, of the adjoining district, presiding. The only case tried was that of Henry Saylor vs. Andrew M. Eastwick. This action was for the recovery of the mesne profits from a tract of coal land in Coal township. After occupying two days in hearing testimony on the part of the plaintiff, the counsel for the defendant asked the Court to nonsuit the plaintiff. On Thursday morning the plaintiff voluntarily suffered a non-suit, when the Court adjourned, the other cases not being ready.

IMPORTANT .- As the season for removals will soon be at hand, the following clause of section 69, of Act of July 13th, 1868, may be of interest to persons doing business requiring a revenue license or special tax receipt, who contemplate a removal :

"And in case of the removal of any person or persons from the house or premises from which any trade, business or profession was taxed, it shall be lawful for the person or persons so removing to any other place, to carry on the trade, business or pro-fessions, specified in the tax receipt, at the place to which such person or persons may remove, without payment of any additional tax."

ANOTHER MOST OUTRAGEOUS ROBBERT IN CHUYLEILL COUNTY .- We learn from the Pottsville Miners' Journal that one night last week the residence of an old couple, Thomas Edwards and wife, three miles from that place, was visited by a band of highwaymen and robbed. The Journal gives the following account of it, as narrated by the

They told her that they would have every feather out of the bed, and that she had eight hundred dollars in the house which she got from her three sons who were in the war. Mrs. Edwards replied that she had not had three sons in the war. The men said they wanted the bank-book. She replied that she had none. They then searched the house and finally decamped with \$100 in money, a silver watch, all the clothing they could find, making it all a loss of \$250. Among the articles stolen was a pair of boots which belonged to and were worn by a son of Mr. Edwards at the time he fell in battle during the rebellion. One of the robbers sat down and pulling off his old boots, put on those of Mr. Edwards son. On the leg of the robbers' old boots left behind were the letters "P. B." They also took a clock, which being heavy, they carried only a short distance. It was found next morning near the house. The poor couple were stripped of almost everything, leaving them in a destitute condition."

### Editor's Table.

THREE TEARS IN THE FIELD HOSPITALS OF THE ARMY OF THE POTOMAC. By Mrs. W. H. Holstein. Philadelphia: J. B. Lippincott & Co. The author of this neat little volume, interesting though unpretending in its character, is an accomplished lady, not unknown in this section of country. Mrs. Holstein is the daughter of the venerable Wm. Cox Ellis. Esq., of Muncy, Lycoming county, formerly member of Congress, and long a distinguished member of the bar. She heroically devoted three years of her life to the relief of the sick and wounded in the field hospitals of the Army of the Potomac. The book is full of incidents characteristic of the American soldier. We quote one of these episodes. which occurred at the White House, on the Pamunkey river, in Virginia, then under the command of Gen. Butler :

"The 5th of June, Mr. Schall came, bringing the body of his brother, Cot. Edwin Schall, to be em-balmed. He fell at Cold Harbour on the 3d of June, shot through the neck. Connected with this gallant officer's death is an incident so singular that it is worthy of record: Sunday, the 7th of June, in the Officers' Hospital in Georgetown, my niece was sitting by her husband's bedside, watching the passsitting by her husband's bedside, watching the pass-ing away of a life now near its close. As the things of earth receded, and another world dawned upon his gare, the lamp of life flickered and fushed in this its closing scene. Suddenly rousing up, his voice, which had previously been faint and feeble, rang out in a clear, loud tone: "Licutenant, leu-tenant!" A wounded licutenant lying near him, answered: "What is it, captain?" He replied: answered: "What is it, captain?" He replied:
"I'm not calling you, it is Lieut. Uol. Schall; I saw
him fall, and thought the way he was lying perhaps
he was dead." His wife soothed him, telting him
"the colonel was all right;" and he sank exhausted

again the same words, that "he had seen him fall,"
