HEAVY ROBBERY .- On Monday night last the residence of Samuel Heim, near the Shamokin dam, was entered by burglars and \$350 in greenbacks taken from a trunk which was in a room in the second story. An entrance was effected through an up stairs window, by means of a ladder, while Mr. Heim and his wife were at the circus. The robbers were heard by an invalid lady who was in bed in the house at the time, but was unable to give the alarm. This is the largest robbery that has occurred here for some time, and the loss is a severe one to Mr. Heim who is a hard working and industrious mechanic .money? POLICE AFFAIRS .- During the past week severa offenders have been added to the number of inmates of the county jail, at this place, who were charged with committing various offences. At present there are no less than fifteen prisoners confined, which shows an alarming increase of crime in this county

On Saturday last a man by the name of Henry Slack and a lewd woman, Anna B. Tona, who have been cohabiting together, in Cake's addition, for some time past, were arrested and committed to prison on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. The parties have been a terror to the neighborhood in which they resided, and the citizens were in constant danger of being injured by them.

On the same day a man named Michael Purse was taken to jail by two of Marshal Heisler's policemen, from Locust Gap, charged with committing a violent assault and battery on the person of John Bram, of that place.

Another prisoner, Patrick Ryan, was committed on the same day by the constable of Coal township. stroying a gate and breaking windows, on the premises of John Myers, of that township, and also with threatening to do him bodily harm.

On Monday last a desperate character named Hugh McCuen was taken to jail by policeman M. J. Shilthorn, of Mt. Carmel. He was charged, on oath of Mrs. E. Mullen, with having attacked and beaten her husband, Edward Mullen, with intent to kill him. We learn that his victim's injuries are of such a serious nature that he is not expected to recover, and bail, which was offered for his release, was consequently refused. It is said that the prisoner committed a murder in the neighborhood of Mt. Carmel, some years since, by deliberately shooting a man dead, and afterwards fied and cluded the pursuit of the officers. He is represented as a villain of the most dangerous character.

Daniel Michael, who hails from Lower Mahanoy township, was committed on Tuesday by Esquire Beard, for drunkenness, and for the purpose of testifying where he procured his liquor. The prisoner stated that he got it from Joseph Long, a hotel keeper in the lower part of Sunbury.

On Wednesday a man, who assumed the name of Edward Spencer, and who said his home was in Harrisburg, was taken to jail by the constable of Milton. He was charged, on oath of Albert Cadwallader, with committing a burglary in Cadwallader's house, in Milton, early on Wednesday morning. He was caught in the act of robbing the house by Mr. Cadwallader's mother, an old lady, who seized him and cried for help, and had the prisoner secured. His person was searched, and a pair of gold spectacles belonging to the plaintiff were found. He confessed

AN OLD VETERAN GONE .- We learn by the Jupiata Sentinel of the death of Benjamin F. Walls Esq., which occurred at his residence in Lack town-ship, Juniata county, on the 16th inst., at the age of sixty-two years. He was well known as the color-bearer of the 47th Pa., Vet. Vols., (a member of Co.C., which was from this place,) and participated in sev-

eral battles during the reballion. The Sentinel, in speaking of him, says:

"Squire Walls was a well known and highly estaumed citizen—a man of more than ordinary intelligence, influence and patriotism. His genuine patriotism was well illustrated in the marked event of his life. Although almost three score years old at the time, he callisted in the service of his country, in the 47th P. V., in August, 1851; and for three eventful years was the faithful color-bearer of his restiment.

eventful years was the initial color-bearer of his regiment.

"The son of a brave Revolutionary sire, Sergeant Walls was "every inch a soldier." In the battle of Pleasant Hill, La., April 9, 1854, he was wounded in the left shoulder, but, against all entreaties to retire, he still held high in the air the flag he loved—held it in his right hand and teeth.

"After his regiment has orders to fall back in the engagement at Poectaligo, "the 'Squire' stood fast until he emptied, on the approaching enemy, several leaded muskets that iny at his feet. In the language of his Colonei, there was no better man in the 47th Regiment."

SHANDRIM APPAIRS.—We copy the following items from the Heraki, of the 18th lest. —Cheries Patrus, a miner, while descending the slope at the Dan Webster Colliery, on Tuesday moraing, slipped when within about 40 yards of the bottom, and fell the entire distance. It is supposed he was seized with the craimp while under the water. Deceased resided in Irish Valley, was much respected, and had been a soldier.

Bittenbender, now leased and worked by the Messrs. Cruikshank. The safety-valve of the engine was found fastened down by wedging a brick be-tween the lever and a rafter in the roof, the damper open, and the fire-doors closed. Fortunately the pressure of steam upon the lever drove the wedge up

far enough to allow a little steam to escape, and as the und amount of coal had not been put on the fire on Friday night, in consequence of the supply being exhausted, it burnt out before sufficient steam to burst the boiler was made.
