THE LUMBER TRADE,-During the month o August there were shipped from Williamsport 16,-231,000 feet of lumber, and from Look Haven and other points west of Williamsport, 4,118,000 feet; making a total shipment for the month of 20,349,-

PEACHES .- The wet weather has very much interfored with the peach trade. Last week peaches were sold as low as two dollars per box, with prospects of a further decline. They rate now from \$2.25 to \$3, according to quality. Last week about 400 boxes were received and disposed of by our dealers. They are getting scarce, but the late peaches will now come in market.

NEW WAREHOUSE -The Northern Central Railroad Cempany is creeting a substantial new warehouse at the Selinsgrove station, five miles below this place. This was a much needed improvement The trade at this point has grown rapidly of late years, and this improvement will be of great convenience to the business men of Sayder and Union counties.



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
