DARING RODDERIES. -On Friday night of last week two of the boldest robberies that we have heard of for a long time, were committed in Irish valley, this county. At a late hour on that night two men went to the house of Mr. J. C. Hoffman, an aged gentleman, and rapped at the door. On being saked who was there, one of the men answered, in a familiar way, "a friend." Mr. Hoffman then asked him his name. The robber answered, "Don't be alarmed; my name is Miller; I was sent here to inform you of the serious illness of your daughter, Susan Reed," who he represented to be very ill, and said that he had been sent to tell him to come to see her immediately. The old gentleman informed him tion in goods. that it was all right, and that he would do so. The robber then said that he was very cold, and requested to be admitted into the house to get warm. Mr. Hoffman then opened the door, and two men immediately entered. They demanded his money, threatening his life in case he refused. He replied that he had no money. One of the robbers instantly drew a club about two feet long and struck him a severe blow on the head, which knocked him senseless and made a terrible wound. Mr. Hoffman's wife was then assaulted, one of the ruffians pointing a revolver at her, and also best her severely. They then compelled the old gentleman to carry a lamp and show them where his money was hidden, which consisted of \$500 in bills, and about \$200 in gold and silver. In the latter amount were six \$10 gold pieces. Mr. Hoffman is an uncle of Deputy Sheriff Hoffman, of this place.

IMPORTANT DECISION BY THE SUPREME COURT.t has been decided by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court that drawing a check on a bank in which the drawer has no funds, and uttering it, is fraud both on the person to whom it is negotiated and on the bank. Case of Peterson vs. Union National Bank. It is fraud in the helder of a cheek to present it for payment, when he knows the drawer has no funds in the bank to meet it. The holder of a sheek deposi-ted it in the bank on which it was drawn, knowing that the drawer had no funds to meet it; it was passed to the holder's credit and charged against the drawer. Held, that this was not payment of the cheek by the bank, and that the holder could not recover the amount from the bank. This decision is of importance to a class of persons who are in the habit of "kiting" checks, giving "momorandum checks and checks dated ahead." All such practices are frauds under this decision, and if the checks so uttered are not stamped as promissory notes they are also in violation of the United States Internal Revenue laws. Persons who are guilty of drawing checks, when they have no funds in bank, very soon lese their credit, and have their accounts closed by the bank, and may consider themselves
