THE BANKBUPT LAW, AND WHO MAY TAKE ADVANTAGE OF IT .- The first of June is the time allowed to those desiring to take advantage of the Bankrupt Law. For the benefit of those who do not fully understand the law, we publish the following abstract :

abstract:

Who may take advantage of this law?

Any person, or firm, who owes debts to the amount of three hundred dollars or upward, whether they be individual or partnership debts, or both, and it makes no difference what is the character of the indebtedness, whether it be by bill, note, account, judgment, as principal, or surety, or otherwise,

What does the law demand of the applicant? That he shall surrender his property, except such as a hereinafter meationed, to his creditors, for a pro rata distribution among them.

What does the law permit the applicant to keep? First.—Household and kitchen furniture and necessaries to the amount of five hundred dollars. Second.—The uniform, arms and equipments of any person who is, or has been, a soldier in the militia or the service of the United States.

Third.—If the applicant is the head of a family, his homestead, to the value of five hundred dollars. If he has no homestead, then in lieu thereof money or other personal property, to the value of three hundred dollars.

If the applicant has only so much property as is above enumerated, of course he has nothing to give up to his creditors.

The result of the benefit of taking this law is a discharge from all indebtedness.

In cases where there is no contest, it requires

discharge from all indebtedness.

In cases where there is no contest, it requires from sixty to ninoty days to procure this discharge.
