Hendricks, recently, we were much pleased at having the privilege of examining his valuable collection of relies and curiesities. In one case we found Indian articles from Fort Augusta, embracing stone durts, bullets, pipes, knives, hatchets, and a string of beads numbering over 5.000. In another case were curiosities from the old world and new, relies of the rebellion from nearly every battle field, minerals from California, Dakotah, &c., Egyptian Granite, Lava from Mt. Vesuvius, piece of the Rock of Gibralter, and various other articles of value. The third case has in it copper cain from 1703 to the present date, silver coin of all nations, United States money from a three

In his collection he has many other articles, among which are "shells from the ocean," muskets, drums, shells, and implements captured during the rebellion, an idol from Africa, sword fish, coral, &c. Mr. Hendricks deserves great credit for the labor he has taken to obtain these articles, and if he could be induced to part with them they would be a great addition to the curiosities of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania. 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
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
