THE SUPPRAGE QUESTION .- The Joint Resolution offered in the House some ten or twelve days age by Gov. Boutwell, of Massachusetts, in the form of an Amendtistics embracing the whole product of the Massachusetts, in the form of an America Anthracite Regions of Fennsylvania, and the ment to the Constitution, which provides for aniversal manhood suffrage throughout the United States, came up on Saturday last for a final vote. Before the vote was taken on the original resolution, the amendment offered by Mr. Bingham and that by Mr. Shellabarger, of Ohio, were voted down by a decided majority ; the vote was then taken, and resulted in the passage of the Amendment, as at first introduced by Mr. Boutwell, by the very strong division of 150 ayes to 42 nays. We believe it was a strict party vote, the Democrats voting in the negative, though many of them voted for the smendments of Bingham and Shellabarger. The resolution now goes to the Senate, where it is believed it will meet with favor-

able consideration at once. The following is the Joint Resolution : Be it resolved, etc., two thirds of both Houses concurring. That the following article be proposed to the Legislatures of the several States as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which, when ratified by three-fourths of said Legislatures, shall be held as part of said Constitution,

name v: Article - Section 1. The right of any citizen of the United States to vote shall not be dealed or abridged by the United States or any State by reason of race, color or previous condition of slavery of any citizen or class of citizens of the United States.

ANOTHER VICTORY OVER THE CAMANCHES

Washington, Jac. 26.—The following has been received at the War Department: HEADQUARTERS IN THE FIELD, FORT Cons. I. T., Dec. 31, 1868. - Brevet Major General W. A. Nichols, Assistant Adjutant General, St. Louis Missouri .- General: I have the honor to report, for the information of the Lieutenant General, the operations of the column from Fort Bascom, under command of Brevet Lieutenant Colonel

A. W. Evans, of the Third Cavelry, On the 7th of December Colonel Evans marched, with detackments of Companies A. C. D. F. G and I, Third Cavalry, and Company I, Thirty seventh Investry, travelling in the direction of the Antelope Hills. On reaching a point near Kiowa creek, forty one miles east of the depot, a trail of about fifty lodges of Cherenne Indians was struck.

The trail was hotly pursued until it led into a canon near the junction of Eim creek and Salt Fork of the Red river, when Colonel Evans made a detour, which brought him, at noon of Christmas day, into a large village of Camanches of sixty lodges, just south of the junction of the Salt Fork with Elm creek, which was totally burned,

The Indians attacked his advance, but were driven from their village with the loss of everything it contained, the women and children escaping by being hastily put on the horses of the warriors, in some cases as many as four on a horse.

The Indians kept up their fighting during the day and the next morning, but there was not much fight is them. Three enlist ed men were wounded, one mortally. The number of Indians killed is unknown

The greatest praise is due Colonel Evans and his command. It marched twenty four days in snow, rain and intensely cold weath er, without any tents of any kind, and finally struck this effective and heavy blow. I and known, through General Hazen and the Indians, of this marauding village. It was composed mostly of individuals from the tribe of Camanches located here, who had reported them to me after my arrival, fearg they might be implicated in their murdering and thieving expeditions on the frontier settlements of Texas.

I can assure the General that he need not expect a continuance of the murders and robberies from Indians in my department hereafter, if one can judge from the demoraization which this winter's campaign has produced among them.
