Sovres.—A good soup contains the nutrient most needed, for a trifling expense, and should be found on every table, at least twice a week, and a day would be better.

A few points are essential in making a good soup. Beef is the best meat for the purpose, as it contains the most nourishment. A shank bone well cracked, that the marrow may be extracted, which you can purchase for the trifling sum of fifteen cents, will make an abundant soup for half a dozen persons twice. The bone should be put to soak in cold water, allowing a full quart for every pound of meat, and a very gradual heat, come to a slow simmer, which should be kept up for five or six hours. Soup should on no account be allowed to boil, except for the last fifteen minutes, to give the vegetables finishing flavor. The first hour the soup should be quietly skimmed. Salt and pepper and every should be cooked in it from the Marrows of Ulysses, blighting their most brilliant hopes of anticipations, rendering marriage, &c., impossible.
