Omelettes are called by the name of what is added to give them flavor, a ham or tongue omelette; a veal kidney omelette, which is a great favorite with a Frenchman, on account of its delicacy; after the kidney is boiled, cut it into dice and beat with the eggs. In the same manner, ham, anchovies or tongue, shred small, makes a delicately flavored dish. Some add onion, parsley, or a clove of eschalot mineed very finely.—Some add chopped oysters.

TO REMOVE TIGHT RINGS.-To remove tightly-fitting rings from a finger without pain, (says the London Lancet) pass the end of a portion of rather fine twine un-derneath the ring, and evenly encircle the finger from below upward (as whipmakers bind lashes on) with the remainder, as far as the centre of the finger, then unwind the string from above downward by taking hold of the end passed under the ring, and it will be found that the ring will gradually pass along the twine toward the tip of the linger.

REMEDY FOR A FELON. - Many persons are liable to extereme suffering from felons on the finger. The following prescription is recommended as a sure cure for the distressing ailment: "Take common rock salt, such as is used for salting down pork or beef, dry it in an oven, then pound it fine and mix with spirits of turpentine in equal parts. Put it on a rag and wrap around the part affected and as it gets dry put on more, and in twenty-lour hours we are cured; the felon is dead." It will do no we are harm to try it.

To CLEAN PAINT .- Save the ten leaves for a few days, then steep them in a tin pail or pau for half an hour, strain through a sieve and use the tea to wash all varnished paint. Whiting is unequaled for cleaning white paint. Take a small quantity on a damp flamel, rub lightly over the surface, and you will be surprised at its effects.

TO CLEANSE BLANKETS .-- Put two large spoonsful of borax, and a pint bowl of soft soap, into a tub of cold water. When dis-solved, put in a pair of blankets, and let them remain over night. Next day, rub and drain them thoroughly in two waters, and hang them to dry. Do not wring

IRON RUST.—This may be removed by salt mixed with a little lemon juice.

MILDEW .- Remove mildew by dipping in sour buttermilk and laying in the sun. REMOVING GREASE FROM SILK .- Apply a little magnesia to the wrong side, and the spots will disappear.

INK STAINS.—Ink stains may sometimes be taken out by smearing with hot tailow, left on when the stained articles go to the

FRUIT STAINS.—Freezing will take out all old fruit stains, and scalding with boiling water will remove those that have never been through the wash.

WRINKLED SILK .- It may be rendered as beautiful as when new by spong ing the surface with a weak solution of gumarable or white glue; then iron on the wrong side.
