COMMENTS. Until the reign of Julius Cresar, about 45 years before the birth of Christ, 365 days constituted the year. The fraction of 6 hours and 11 minutes were then not counted. At that time these fractions amounted to 90 days, and the first year of the Julian era was made up of 15 months. Casar then ordained that the 6 hours' fraction of each year should be added together every fourth year and make an additional day in February. But the remaining error of 11 minutes, which nic of the Conclaves was altogether a success- properly belonged to each year up to A. D. 1582, amounted to 10 days. Pope Gregory then ordainguests from Sunbury, and the guests from Nor- od that the 10 days should be deducted, and the 5th of October was called the 15th. The Lutherans of Germany and other Protestants did not adopt the new or Roman style until the year 1700, when the additional accumulations of the 11 minutes made it necessary to omit eleven instead of ten days. In 1751 it was enacted by the British Parliament that eleven days should be omitted after the 2d day of Sept. 1752, so the ensuing day should be the 14th, and it further enacted in order to counteract a certain small overplus of time, that every four hundr edth year, beginning with the year 2000, shall not be considered a leap year. The year 1800, therefore, not being considered leap year by us, another (or twelfth) day has been added between the old and new style.
