

**CURE OF RHEUMATISM IN HORSES.**—The *Scientific American* prints this note from a correspondent: I give you the following recipe for rheumatism in horses; and I will preface it by saying that I am indebted to an Englishman (Mr. R. Jackson) for the same; also, that I have used the receipt upon my horse (whose age is fifteen years) with perfect success—driving him daily, twelve miles, in all sorts of weather (thermometer from 10 deg. below zero Fahr. in the winter, to 104 deg. in the shade, in summer), rain or snow. About two months ago he was so stiff he could not walk; now he is as active as a cat. The receipt is:

Crude coal oil, 1 pint; strong vinegar,  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint; turpentine,  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint, mixed, and well shaken. To be rubbed on mornings and nights.
