MINCE PIES.—Boil five pounds of lean and juicy beef, until tender, and while boiling, keep closely covered, when cool chop very fine. Chop well three pounds of nice beef suet; seed three pounds of raisins, and chop; three pounds of well-washed and dried currants, two pounds of citron cut into thin slices; grate the rind of six fresh lemons; two table-spoonfuls of cinnamon; four good sized nutmegs grated; one tea-spoonful ground white ginger; one tea-spoonful of salt; chop finely fourteen good sized plippins; mix these well together, and if necessary use more apples; put in a stone pot; cover it with good French brandy and wine; this must be kept in a cool, dry place, and improves by keeping; a little good cider is quite an improvement, added just before it is baked.

MINCE PIES No. 2.—Three pounds of tender lean beef, one pound of suet, two pounds of chopped apples, two of raisins, two of currants, one of citron, two and one-half of sugar, a gill of molasses, of rose water, the juice of two lemons, the same of oranges, (peel of latter chopped fine and added) and one gill of brandy, cloves, allspice, pepper, cinnamon, nutmeg, &c., according to taste. Add cider previous to baking.

MAINE MINCE PIE.—One bowl of chopped meat; one bowl of chopped suet; one bowl of chopped raisins; one bowl of cider; one bowl of sugar; two bowls of chopped apples; one-half bowl of molasses; three lemons; a taste. Mrs. MILLARD.

RICH OYSTER PIE.—Strain off the liquor from the oysters, and put it on to boil, with some butter, mace, nutmeg, pepper and salt. Just as it boils, stir in a thickening of milk and flour, put in the oysters and stir until they are sufficiently stewed, then take them out, and put in the yolks of two eggs, well beaten (do not put this in while it is boiling, or it will curdle.) Line a dish, with very deep, with puff paste; fill it with white unglazed paper or a napkin, to keep the top paste from falling in; put on top paste and bake. When done, remove the top paste carefully, and take out the paper or napkin, and pour in the oysters. Send it hot to table.

OYSTER SOUP.—Take two quarts of water, or the liquor of boiled fowls; put in it three plums of oysters; salt, and pepper to your taste, one table-spoonful of butter rubbed in the same of flour. Beat the yolks of four eggs, and mix them with one pint of sweet milk and the oyster liquor (previously straining it) and add to the soup. Let it cook a few moments; then pour in a soup tureen with a few slices of toasted bread (well buttered) and serve hot. Nothing will so detract from the quality of soup as to serve it lukewarm.

PUMPKIN PIE.—Cut the pumpkin into small slices, take out the seed, and boil it over a moderate fire, with just sufficient water to keep it from burning at the bottom of the pot. When stewed soft, turn off the water, and let it stand over a slow fire for fifteen or twenty minutes, taking care that it does not burn; then remove it from the fire, strain it through a colander when cool. If you wish the pie very rich, to which two quarts of strained pumpkin, put two quarts of milk and ten eggs; if plain, use a quart only of milk to one of the pumpkin, and three or four eggs; add sugar, salt, and ginger, to the taste. Bake as soon as filled.

BAKED INDIAN PUDDING.—Scald one quart of milk, add seven table-spoonfuls of Indian meal, molasses, and sugar to suit the taste, one tea-spoonful of cinnamon and ginger, one-half tea-spoonful of salt, stir the milk in cold milk, then add to the scalded milk.—Bake in an hour or more. M. N. P.

PRESSED GRAPES.—There is no trouble in keeping grapes through the winter as fresh as when they are first gathered. In seasons when other fruit is scarce no greater luxury can be enjoyed than a dish of fresh grapes in winter. In gathering grapes for keeping fresh, they should be allowed to hang on the vines until they are fully ripe, and then gathered with care to avoid bruising. The fruit should be washed in clean water to put away, and with a pair of small scissors all defective or bruised grapes should be cut off. They should then be placed in boxes well-ventilated, and remain for a few days, when they should be packed in boxes holding six or eight pounds each, first sprinkling the bottom with a lot of unglazed paper, and the top with better, turning slips, then a layer of paper, and then saw-dust alternately to the top. It is not important that the box be tight; it is better that it should not be. These should be put in the coolest place in the house, where their is dry.
