The correspondent of the *Militia*, from this place, makes mention of the following in the last issue of that paper:

"Two cases were tried before A. N. Brice, J. P., on Saturday last, which involve matters of general importance. Ephraim R. Miller sued for himself as well as for the School Directors of Shamokin township. In the one case he sued Furman Farwasworth, and in the other Freeman W. Sober, the former of whom was a township Auditor in 1863, and the latter has been since 1869. The suit was brought under the Act of April 14, 1866, for penalty in not auditing the boundary accounts of said township. The act provides that they shall be audited every year under a penalty of \$50 for each offence. It appears that the first audit was made in 1867. There has been none made since that time until the spring of 1871. One half the penalty goes to the informer and the other half to the school fund.
