proved ineffectual.

The most effectual kicking strap that has been devised, consists of two pulleys fastened into a leather cover, and attuched to the circingle under the belly, near the forelege. A leather strap passes through the forward pulley, attached to each fore leg, near the body. Another strap passes through the hind pulley, fastened to each hind leg, near the body. These straps play through the pulleys according to the movement of each leg. Only one foot can move at the same time, which confines the horse to the walk or trot. They cannot break up, jump back, or run away. In the net of walking or trotting there is no serious obstruction, and this rigging may be used to learn horses to trot without breaking.

With an additional strap, it would prove safety valve to prevent danger in life or limb from headstrong running brutes, and a sovereign remedy against kicking in har-

The old-fashioned kicking strap passes over the hips, attached to the shads of the buggy or cart. The overcheck may be converted into a kicking strap, by passing the check-line through the terrets in the saddle to a loop on the rump, crossing down the hips, and attached to the shafts of the vehiele. When the horse kicks, it forces his head up with a sudden jerk. This self-inflicted punishment prevents a repetition.

Pulling at the balter is another perniclous habit that may be corrected by simply passing the halter rope through a ring in the marger and attaching the same to the hind foot. When the horse settles back to pull, the strain comes upon the leg, which prevents him from repeating the experiment. He will soon give up the habit of pulling to strain his hind leg. The same effect will be produced by fixing a gearing in the shape of a crooper, attached to the manger, that will pull upon the tail. — Turf Field and Farm,

surround the lungs require the benefit of a blanket in preference to its flank and rump When we are exposed to a current of cold air, to guard against any injury from tak-ing cold, we shield our shoulders, neck, chest and back. If these parts are protec-ted, the lower part of the body will endure a degree of cold far more intense, without any injury to the body, than if the lungs were not kept warm with suitable covering. The same thing holds good in the protection of horses. The blanket should cover the neck wither, and shoulders, and be brought around the breast and buttoned or buckled together as closely as a man buttons his overcoat when about to face a driving storm. Let the lungs of a horse be well protected with a heavy blanker, and he will seldom contract a cold, even if the hindmost parts of his body are not covered. Many of our best teamsters protect the breasts of their horses by a piece of cloth about two feet square, banging down from the lower end of the collar. This is an excellent practice in cold weather, as the most important part of the animal is constantly sheltered from the cold wind, especially when traveling towards a strong current. The forward end of horseblankets should be made as closely around the breast of a horse as our garments fit our bodies. Most orses take cold as readily as men, if not blanketed while standing, after exercising sufficiently to produce perspiration. ## Hecipes, &c.

We find the following receipts and suggestions, written by a practical citizen of Baltimore county, Md., to the Country Gentleman:

HEAD CHEESE AND SAUSAGE. For head cheese, take off the cars and noses, and pick out the eyes; by the heads in sait and water-over night, then wash and put them (with the cars and skins) on to boil; boil till the bones come out easily. Season twenty pounds of meat with half pound of salt, three heaping tablespoonsful of sage, three of pepper and two of thyme. For more or less meat, season accordingly. After sensoning, thop fine pour the meat in milk-pans, pack closely, and cover with paper greased with melted lard, and lastly cover with boards or plates. Hog's head choose may be enten cold, with or without vincear, or fried as sausage.

For saues, e meat, take all the clippings, a portion of fat, liver and heart, chop line, previous to seasoning and packing. The number of propositions and vised for hog's head theese is a good precedent as regards sen-soning and packing. The middlings, is very fat, pay best when the lean parts are converted into sausage ment, the fat into lard, and the skins to increase the bulk of hog's head choose. Previous to pucking, fry a small portion of the ment to test the sensoning; if not satisfactory, it can be altered by adding more ment or increasing n portion of the scatoning.

MAKING HOMINY .- If I am not mistaken, hominy is soldom found on castern tables. At the South it is an everyday winter dish, and can be found in all the Southern markets, either cooked or pounded. As regards excellence, it may be called the twin sister of that excellent winter dish called pork and beans. It is prepared and cooked thus: Take say three quarts of white flint corn ; put it in an fron or wooden mortar and pound it with an iron peatle till the hulls are removed and the grains broken; blow out the hulls; soak over night in pure fresh water, (soak the beaus also, and boil three hours; then add one pint of white beans, and boil two hours longer. Small hominy or grits will be cook-ed in half the time. It is eaten like corn mush, with boiled milk, with butter or fried in lard. In our flour mills are generally found hominy beaters; the mortars are made of iron and conical, a dozen or more in a line, and over them a continuous re-volving iron crank, to which the pestles are attached, haif of them striking the corner alternately. Season with sait, or add a small piece of sait pork when boiling.

PORK AND BEANS .- Pick out from a quart of white beans all that are imperfect: soak them in water over night, which will more than double the bulk. Boil two hours with plenty of water; at the same time boil about two pounds fat pork till done: pour the beans in a shallow earthen pan; slice the skin of the pork and place it (desh side down) in the centre of the beans; then coat the pork and beans with best molasses or syrup. Bake till brown. A substantial dinner for four to six persons, and costing about fifty cents. Dew Abbertisements.
