SPRING CHICKENS .- Very early spring chickens are generally dear, and pay extra-ordinkry woll for raising, and they are much easier brought through the cold weather of the latter part of February and the following month than people suppose, and as practical knowledge is worth much and as practical knowledge is worth much more than aught else, what I am going to say can be done, and has been done by the writer and his better half. Having little birds, rather larger than pigeons, sell for 75 cents each in April and May, giving a dollar per couple clear profit, is making money fast enough to satisfy resonable peo-ple. The way to do it is to have the hens all comfortably lodged in a warm roost by

DOM: TO BANK

the 1st of January. Have some nice, snug, warmly situated pests in a place near the roost for the hens to lay in, and contrive that they can go to and from without going into the bad wea-ther, and if they have been well fed they will be laying when the new year begins, and if Braham blood is in them (half will do) they will sit by the end of the month ; after hatching, put thom in coops which can be closed and made dark by fastening up a front board-then in bad weather the chickons can be fed by letting down the board, and be shut up again as soon as they have caten, which will cause the hen to sit stil and nurse them till they are fed again ; have no bottoms to the coops and move every day, putting dry fine straw or any kind of litter under the coop when the ground is wet, but in moderate weather or whenever dry let them be on the sod. Keep the hen contined till the chickons are a mouth old, unless unusually mild, and these coops be on a slope facing the south. and away from the haunts of the old fowls There are many days in February when the chickens will run around the coop picking up blades of grass, &c., enjoying the sunshine, which puts them in strong health and clear confinement in cold spells and during snow storms, which, with these coops, do not hurt them at all ; and there will be no dropping wings and no crying, as there invariably is when little chickens are raised in glass hot-houses or in any kind of houses or barns ; for in any of these places they miss the fresh ground to be daily moved on, and the fresh air and sunshine which gives them an appetite out-ofdoors, however spacious the apartments may be. I have had to dig the snow away from the coops several times in one season. and brush places for them to be placed on, which is quickly done by having a spare coop and going from one to the other with a basket; and by 10 or 11 o'clock the whole of the broods from 10 to 40 coops would be seen as brisk as bees, a dozen or more at each coop, and racing to meet the feeder.

The feed requires variation and should be given every two or threa hours---say one day scalded meal at 7---wheat or barley at 9-cracked corn at 12-liver or other meat chopped fine, at 2-and bread sopped in milk with oats or any dry grain, at 4, and then shut them up. Next day, egg shells broken fine mixed with the morning's first meal, and give one feed of some kind of sprouted grain in about such a stage as mait is made, and vary this feeding as convenient, and as the chickens seem to prefer one form to another ; for generally what they like best is best for them, as nature seldom gives desire for that which is not good-and in case of anything being too rich, it will cloy them till the system requires more, -- Country Gentleman.

FRESH EGGS .- The way to have fresh eggs at all seasons of the year, and the only way I know of, is to have a breed of hens that will lay in the winter as well as in the summer. In order to accomplish this-1. Get the hens. 2. Keep them welltgive them a variety of food --- pounded bone in the winer to take the place of gravel in the summer. 3. Give them warm roosting places; a ben that is kept poor and froze every night, will not hay an egg next day: A good heu is, like a grist mill; if we expect big grists, we must till the hopper. 4 Hatch grists, we must ill the hopper. 4 Hatch out carly pullets to lay in the fail while the old hens are moulting, as they will stop laying for a few days during this process, and keep mostly nullets over winter, as they will lay more eggs the first year than the second year, and so on, There is scarcely a day in the whole year that I do not bring iresh eggs from the barn to the house. ----I'LANTS FOR SUNNY WINDOWS .- If your windows is sunny there is no limit to the flowers you may have from Christmas until the wild ones come again. With two maurandias, one white, the other purple, with a high colored dwarf nasturtium, or troppedeum, as it is called, an English ivy and a vigorous plant of German Lyy, or senecejo scaudens, you can make a screet for your window more beautiful than any Raphael or Da Vinci over designed, for yours is the perfect original of their defec tive representation. The vines should be at the ends of the box, so as to be trailed on the sides and over the top of the window frame. Then, close to the glass, for true to its name it loves the sun, but a hallotrope or two, a trailing, winter-blossoming fuchsia, a scarlet geranium, and, for the sake of contrast, a white one, whose flowers have a bright eye in the contrel. Do not be afraid of crowding the plants, but sow mignonette and a sweet alyssum seed, as well as the tiny ones of linaria cymbalroria, or coliseum ivy. If not intending to have but one box, do not forget a plant or two of the next, handsomely marked petunias, for they will give you a mass of flowers from the first week of blooming until put out in the parden in the spring. Yellow myrtle, and the plants commonly called Wandering Jew and fee plant, as well as a variety of saxifrage, known as beefsteak geranium, may be made to drop over the front of your box, and their graceful sprays will reach even to the floor, if you wish. FROZEN PLANTS .-. Some clear, still night Jack Frost will find his way into the lady's parlor or chamber, in which she keeps her dants, and, all mell next morning by sweet pets will be as rigid as the artificial flowers on her boungt. Now, what shall be done ? Don't hurry them into a warm room by the side of a stove, as you would a frost-bitten chicken. Let them remain where they were frozen ; close the window shutters or drop the curtains, so as to make the room quite dark ; then sprinkle the plants with cold water direct from the cistern, and wait for the result. Do not allow the room to become warmer than fortyseven degrees for twenty-four hours. If a few drops of spirits of camphor are thrown into the dish of water before sprinkling it will be all the better. Plants treated in in this way, though frozen so badly that the water will freeze on when sprinkled. yet by keeping the room dark and cool for an entire day they will come out unharmed. SICK HORSES .- Linseed tea is not only a valuable restorative for sick horses, but is exceedingly useful in cases of inflammation of the membranes, p culiar to the or-gans of respiration and digestion ; it shields and lubricates the same, tranquilizes the irritable state of the parts and favors heatthy action. Put a couple of handsful of seed into a bucket, and pour a gallon and a half of boiling water upon it. Cover it up a short time ; then add a couple of quarts of cold water, when it will be fit for use. In case of an irritating cough add me honey.


